**Panel Discussion**Bayfront Room**Practical Issues Related to Expanding Class Sizes**

*Objective:* U.S. medical schools are seeing a significant upsurge in enrollment levels and applicants. The 2005-2006 entering class is the largest on record, with more than 17,000 first-time enrollees, a 2.1 percent increase over the 2004 total of 16,648 students. Twenty-two of the nation's 125 allopathic schools expanded their class size by 5 percent or more during the past year, with seven of these 22 institutions boosting first-year enrollment by more than 10 percent. Several of these schools will be represented on a panel to discuss the practical issues that arise when class sizes are expanded. The issues discussed will include how schools are managing facilities, equipment, clerkships and other educational programs in light of the larger class sizes. Issues related to providing student services and mentors will be discussed, along with the impact of larger class sizes on the faculty's teaching and other responsibilities. Panelists will discuss their views on the barriers to increasing class sizes, whether perceived barriers are real, and if so, how they can be mitigated or overcome.
