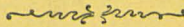

Sixth Annual Announcement.

GROWTH OF THE SCHOOL.

The friends of the Columbus Medical College will be pleased to learn that the last was the most prosperous year of its existence. An uninterrupted prosperity has marked its course from the first; the most sanguine could not have expected more. The growth has been rapid and substantial. It is questionable whether any other like institution can chronicle a more satisfactory progress. This is a matter of just pride to the Faculty, and of thankfulness on their part for the liberal and timely assistance of its friends. We hope this success is not unmerited. It has been the aim of the Faculty to place the Columbus Medical College abreast of the best in the land. To this end everything has been done that could be done. The manner and means of teaching have been altered from time to time to conform to this idea; new and improved methods have been adopted, and those less effective have been discarded. Every department has been overhauled, rearranged and amplified; charts, casts, instruments and appliances have been added, and the museum has been enriched by a number of rare and instructive specimens. The resources of the College, which have multiplied *pari passu* with the patronage bestowed upon it, have all been applied to this end.

By consulting the roster of the Faculty, it will be observed that Dr. WILLIAM WARNER has been appointed to the Chair of Physiology, made vacant by the continued illness of Dr. H. E. JONES. Dr. WARNER is a graduate of this College. His attainments in this department, and his success as a teacher last winter, while acting as Assistant to the Chair of Practice, have proven him worthy of this appointment.

REGULAR COURSE.

After mature consideration, the Trustees and Faculty have decided to extend their course of didactic instruction from twenty weeks, now required by the Association of

American Medical Colleges, to twenty-four weeks. This step they believe will be fully endorsed by the profession. It is one of the means by which the Trustees and Faculty hope to elevate the standard of professional acquirement among their students. They have been for a long time convinced that if an increased amount of instruction were the object aimed at in the establishment of a Preliminary Course, it was almost an absolute failure, and that this object could be better accomplished in the regular course. Recognizing no other object for a Preliminary Course, which was worthy of consideration, the Trustees have abolished this course, and have ordered that *the Regular Course shall be opened on September 1, 1880, and close on the 1st day of March, 1881.* This will make the course of didactic lectures six months in length. The cost to the student is not hereby increased, and, instead of desultory and disconnected lectures, he will have the advantage of methodical and continuous instruction.

The Trustees and Faculty of Columbus Medical College will always respond, in the fullest measure, to the obligations laid upon them by their pupils and patrons.

The entire income of the school is pledged to the increase of its facilities for instruction in all branches.

COLLEGE BUILDING.

The College Building is located on the corner of High and Long streets. The apartments include a museum room, general lecture room, admirably arranged amphitheatre, dissecting room and laboratory. All are abundantly supplied with gas and Holly water.

They are so arranged and connected as to give them great completeness, for the purposes of a Medical College. We venture to promise students accommodations equaled by few—excelled by none.

The *location* does not admit of improvement, being at the practical center of the street railway system, so that every part of the city is within easy reach.

Owing to the large attendance at the last session, it was found necessary to enlarge the amphitheatre and construct a new general lecture room.

MUSEUM.

The museum room is closely connected with both the amphitheatre and the general lecture room. It is provided

with carefully arranged cases, is well lighted, and will be kept constantly heated, thus rendering the extensive pathological collection of Professor Hamilton, fully available for the purposes of instruction. Extensive and beautiful additions have been made to this department. Among them are, a full set of the *papier mache* Anatomical Preparations of Ramme & Sadtman, of Hamburg, a complete set of Prof. Bock's Anatomical Models, an Osteological Cabinet of twenty-four complete skeletons, a magnificent Stereopticon, and four fine class Microscopes.

ADVANTAGES TO STUDENTS.

We are now, in point of the number of students in attendance, among the first Medical Colleges in the State; in standing, we are surpassed by none; we are free from pecuniary embarrassments, vigorous and healthy; in the way of tuition, and absence of side expenses, we present strong inducements, while our clinical advantages are of that wide and varied character which are only available in cities, endowed, as this is, with eleemosynary and penal institutions. The city in which we are located has 50,000 inhabitants; is noted for its beauty, healthfulness and hospitality; is accessible by rail from every quarter, and here, to a most unusual degree, may be found cheapness of living combined with the comforts and luxuries of city life.

These advantages naturally serve to make this an elective point with medical students.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The course of instruction will consist of Didactic and Clinical Lectures, with daily examinations in each department. We believe these examinations to be indispensable to successful teaching.

We propose to direct the labors of our students to eight elementary branches, with as many Professorships. As adjuncts to these, Lectureships are established, which will be increased as our opportunities and wants may suggest or require. We propose to do thorough work, and avoid mere smattering. With an excessive number of studies this is impossible.

Including Clinics, five lectures will be given daily.

SURGERY.

The graduating class will be expected to perform the various operations upon the cadaver, under the immediate direction of the Professor. A full course in Minor Surgery will be given by the Adjunct Professor, in which each student will be required to apply the various forms of dressing.

OBSTETRICS.

In the department of Obstetrics, the teaching will be practical, and the various obstetric operations will be illustrated upon the Manikin. As far as possible, cases will be assigned to the members of the graduating class for attendance, who will receive such assistance as may be necessary.

A full set of Obstetric Charts and a Manikin belong to this department.

CHEMISTRY.

In addition to the usual lectures in this department, advanced students may receive practical instruction, under the supervision of an amply qualified Demonstrator, in chemical manipulations, including analysis of the urine, blood, wall-papers, etc., and such other work as the practitioner may be called to perform.

Each student will be charged a fee of five dollars, to cover cost of chemicals and breakage, if he takes a course in practical chemistry.

MATERIA MEDICA.

Special attention will be paid to the physical properties of drugs, as they reach the practitioner, and to the ready means for determining their purity, and detecting adulteration.

The Physiological as well as the Clinical *action* of Medicines will be discussed and illustrated by experimentation. *The physiological antagonism of drugs, and their toxicology, will be duly considered.*

In this department an addition has been made of a complete set of crude drugs, presented to the institution by the house of R. Jones & Son. This, added to a fine set of chemicals from Messrs. Powers & Weightman, with fluid extracts, resinoids, etc., from Tilden & Co., Parke, Davis & Co., and the house of Sharp & Dohme, makes our collection complete.

GYNECOLOGY.

This department will be taught by Lectures, illustrated by drawings, charts and clinics.

THEORY AND PRACTICE OF MEDICINE.

In addition to the Chairs of Practice of Medicine and Diseases of Children, the Trustees have established a Lectureship, in this department, on Physical Diagnosis, proficiency in which will hereafter be a prerequisite of graduation.

The Senior Class will be divided into sections, so that each student will receive personal instruction.

This department has been placed in charge of a gentleman who has had rare opportunities for qualifying himself for his work. His success in teaching this branch during the last term was highly satisfactory, both to the Trustees and his class.

The College Microscopes and Stereopticon, with their accompanying large collections of preparations, photographs and slides, will be freely drawn upon in this department to illustrate Physiological and Pathological Histology, and to show the various changes which take place in the organs as the result of disease. It is hoped that this use of the microscopes will cause the students to acquire a familiarity with this very important means of diagnosis.

A weekly Clinic will be conducted by the teachers in this department at the College.

ANATOMY.

Our dissecting room cannot be excelled. Every possible facility is afforded for good and thorough work. Throughout the history of the Institution, dissecting material has been in excess. A full set of dissections, embracing at least a half subject, will be exacted of every candidate for graduation.

Osteology will occupy twenty-four Lectures; about sixty lectures will be devoted to the soft parts. The large Osteological Cabinet, which has just been secured, will supply such a number of specimens of the more important bones, for distribution among the members of the class, as will enable every student to become personally familiar with their structure and appearance.

PHYSIOLOGY AND PHYSIOLOGICAL ANATOMY.

Will be fully illustrated by drawings and charts, by numerous vivisections, and by frequent use of the microscope. Charts, drawings and diagrams have been made for this department.

The lectures in all departments, as far as possible, will be illustrated by means of a Projection Apparatus and Screen. For this purpose the Trustees have procured a Stereopticon, and an extensive collection of slides and photographs, which will fully illustrate Anatomy, Physiology and Pathological Anatomy.

CENSORS.

Wishing to maintain the most intimate and cordial relations with the profession, and desirous of giving opportunity for the most searching scrutiny of our work, especially in reference to conferring degrees, the Faculty have selected a Board of Censors, representing most parts of the State, who will be duly notified and requested to be present to witness examinations, and join the Faculty in passing upon candidates. It is but simple justice that the profession itself, through intelligent and disinterested representatives, should have the opportunity of guarding its own portals against the admission of unworthy or incompetent persons.

CLINICS.

The Surgical Clinics of Prof. Hamilton, have been the principal source of Surgical Clinical instruction in this city for the last twenty-eight years. They are crowded with cases of rare interest and importance—all the western States being more or less tributary to them. They grow in interest and importance every year, and will be continued, as usual.

The departments of Practice, Gynecology, Diseases of Children, and Physical Diagnosis, also give Clinics, regularly, in the college building.

ARTICLES OF CONFEDERATION.

ARTICLE I.—OF THE FACULTY.

The medical members of the Faculty must be REGULAR graduates, or licentiates and practitioners of medicine, in good standing—using the word “regular” in the sense commonly understood in the medical profession

ARTICLE II.—OF TUITION.

§ 1. The scheme of tuition shall provide for a yearly systematic Course of Instruction, covering the general topics of Anatomy—including Dissections, Physiology, Chemistry, Materia Medica and Therapeutics, Obstetrics, Surgery, Pathology and Practice of Medicine. The Collegiate session, wherein this Course is given, shall be understood as the “regular” session.

§ 2. Said regular session shall not be less than twenty weeks in duration. This section to go in force at and after the session of 1879-80.

§ 3. Not more than one regular session, counting the regular session as one of the two Courses of Instruction required for graduation, shall be held in the same year.

ARTICLE III.—REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

No person, whether a graduate in medicine or not, shall be given a Diploma of “Doctor of Medicine,” who shall not have fulfilled the following requirements, EXCEPT as hereinafter provided for in Article IV :

§ 1. He must produce satisfactory evidence of good moral character, and of having attained the age of twenty-one years.

§ 2. He must file a satisfactory certificate of having studied medicine for at least three years under a REGULAR graduate, or licentiate and practitioner of medicine, and in good standing—using the word “regular” in the sense commonly understood in the medical profession. No candidate shall be eligible for final examination, for graduation, unless his term of three years’ study shall have been completed, or shall have expired at a date not later than three months after the close of the final examination. This clause to take effect at and after the session of 1879-80.

§ 3. He must file the proper official evidence that, during the above-mentioned three years, he has matriculated at some affiliated College or Colleges, for two regular sessions, and in the course of the same (except as provided in 4) has attended two full Courses of Instruction on the seven topics mentioned in Article II; but the LATTER, at least, of the two full Courses must have been attended at the College issuing the Diploma. No two consecutive Courses of Instruction shall be held as satisfying the above requirements, unless the time between the beginning of the first Course and the end of the second is greater than fifteen months.

§ 4. In case a College shall adopt a systematic graduated scheme of tuition, attendance on the whole of the same shall be equivalent to the requirements mentioned in 3; *provided*, such scheme includes instruction in the seven topics mentioned in Article II, and requires attendance of at least two yearly regular Collegiate sessions, of not less than twenty weeks' duration each.

§ 5. The candidate must have passed a personal examination before the Faculty on all seven of the branches of medicine mentioned in Article II.

§ 6. He must have paid in full all College dues, including the graduation fee.

ARTICLE IV—OF HONORARY DEGREES.

An Honorary Degree of "Doctor of Medicine" may be granted, in numbers not exceeding one yearly, to distinguished physicians or scientific men of over forty years of age; but, in such case, the Diploma shall bear across its face the word "Honorary," in conspicuous characters, and the same word shall always be appended to the name of the recipient in all lists of graduates.

ARTICLE V—OF FEES.

§ 1. All fees shall be paid in lawful money, and no promissory notes or promises to pay shall be accepted in lieu of cash for payment of fees.

§ 2. No ticket, or other certificate of attendance upon College exercises, shall be issued to any student until the dues for the same shall have been fully paid.

§ 3. The established fees for the exercises of the regular session—except the matriculation fee, graduating fee, fee for dissections—may be reduced, not more than one-half, to graduates of other affiliated Colleges of less than three years' standing, and to under-graduates of the same who have already attended two full Courses of the Instruction of the regular session.

§ 4. The same fees may be remitted altogether to a College's own alumni, to graduates of other affiliated Colleges of three years' standing—the three years dating from the time of graduation, and ending at the close of the regular session for which the tickets are given—to under

graduates who have already attended two full Courses of the Instruction of the regular session—the latter of which, at least, shall have been in the Collège making the remission—and to theological students, when not candidates for a Diploma.

§ 5. The same fees may be reduced or remitted to deserving indigent students, to a number not exceeding five per cent. of the number of matriculants at the previous regular session of the Collège.

§ 6. Under no circumstances whatever, other than the above, shall the Faculties, or any number of the same, grant, UPON THEIR OWN AUTHORITY, any remissions or reductions of established fees. And it is distinctly understood and agreed that the Faculties will discountenance and oppose the authorizing by governing Boards of the admission of individual students upon other than the regularly established charges for their grade.

§ 7. Remission or reduction of fees for other exercises than those of the regular session, return to a student of any moneys after payment of fees, or an appropriation of funds of the Collège for payment of any student's fees, or part thereof, shall be deemed violation of the provisions of this Article in regard to remission or reduction of fees.

ARTICLE VII—AMENDMENTS.

Amendments to these Articles shall be proposed and adopted in the manner prescribed for amendments to the Constitution.
