# TO:OSR Administrative BoardFROM:Template for OSR Proposals

All ideas for OSR projects/resources must go through the project proposal process:

- 1) Create a project proposal and send to OSR Chair and OSR Director for review.
- 2) Update the proposal accordingly based on feedback received and submit to the OSR Administrative Board for review and approval through the OSR office/Director.
- 3) Think about expectation level for projects, goals, metrics for success, and overall impact of final outcome: how will this project help the OSR/medical students?

# Problem:

• Identify the problem/issue this project hopes to solve

# Goal:

- What is the overall goal of the project?
- How does this project benefit the OSR/medical students?

# Background:

- Give some background on the issue.
- What resources and knowledge already exist?
- Why are these insufficient?
- What gaps exist that you would like to try and fill?

# **Proposed Initiative:**

- How would you like this issue addressed?
- Highlight how the problem will be solved by this project
- Give a basic timeline of when you anticipate the given steps will be addressed and completed.
- Be sure to include steps such as seeking IRB approval (if necessary), contacting OSR reps or schools, distributing a survey, etc.
- Provide any information on the roles that different committees, the OSR Ad Board, and OSR staff members would have.

# **Resources required:**

- What steps will require significant staff time to complete?
- What will/might require OSR funding to be used?
- Roughly how much will it cost?

# Anticipated collaborators:

- Are there other portions of the AAMC or external stakeholders who will be involved?
- What will be their responsibilities/roles?
- Will they be expected to contribute substantial resources?
- What communication have you had that indicates that they might be interested in this issue?
- Is their involvement critical to the proposed project or could you still move forward if they decline to become involved?

# **Final product:**

- What will be the final product(s)? What will the OSR produce/publish/be able to demonstrate/etc.?
- Do you envision a product from the AAMC, guidelines, recommendations, etc.?
- How do you think this could be utilized?
- What, ideally, would be the impact on the issue?

# Anticipated evaluation and follow-up:

• How will you evaluate both your process and product?

• What will you do so that the lessons you learn can be used in the future?
