ANNOUNCEMENT

OF THE

ATLANTA MEDICAL COLLEGE.

The twenty-third Annual Course of Lectures in this Institution will commence on the second Wednesday (15th) of October, 1880, and close on the second of March, 1881.

Students should bear in mird that this is the opening of the Regular Session. Owing to the lengthening of the term of Lectures, the preliminary course has been dispensed with.

The Introductory Lecture will be made by Prof. Miller, at 11 A.M., at the College.

For the Christmas holidays, the exercises will be suspended on December 23d and resumed on January 3d.

The Trustees and Faculty feel secure in presenting the claims of the Atlanta Medical College to those desiring a medical education. They are assured that many causes combine to render this city, of near 50,000 people, the great medical centre of the South.

Her extensive railroad connections make it easily accessible from all points.

The energy of her people in every avocation has conferred a prosperity that is proverbial.

The expenses of living, in whatever style, are cheaper, we believe, than in any city of like size in the United States.

Epidemics are unknown in this city. There is no malaria with us. Those who have been affected by this poison in other localities find here a retreat in which they may recover their health. Students from the North or West may find here, while acquiring their education, protection from the dangers of a more rigorous climate, without subjecting themselves to the risk of other diseases.

The climate is healthy and bracing, and well adapted for sustaining a student through the physical and mental strain of a course of medical lectures.

The Faculty avail themselves of every facility for clinical and didactic teaching. Not only does Atlanta, with a large proportion of inhabitants dependent on charity for medical attention, afford a vast amount of clinical material, but her central position and railroad facilities draw from a distance a great number of interesting cases that may be presented before the class.

The Faculty constantly and zealously labor to utilize all these advantages in placing the Atlanta Medical College among the foremost in imparting a THOROUGH AND PRACTICAL KNOWLEDGE of medical science in all its principles and details. They claim that its prosperous condition and constantly increasing classes for years past are the highest evidence of the achievement of this object.

SURGERY.

Surgery is systematically taught by lectures, and is practically demonstrated by capital and minor operations, in the amphitheatre, in the presence of the class. These clinics are held twice each week, and afford more material of all forms of surgical disease than can be utilized.

In this department the students are taught and required themselves to apply all forms of bandages, together with every form of apparatus for treating fractures and dislocations. These injuries must be treated by every physician, and there is but this one way of acquiring the necessary knowledge. Before the close of the session the students are afforded opportunity of performing all surgical operations on the cadaver, under the direction of the Professor of Surgery. We feel warranted in saying that the efficient and untiring labor in this department is unsurpassed in any Medical College.

DISEASES OF THE EYE AND EAR, AND THROAT.

, DISEASES OF THE EYE AND EAR form an important and growing specialty, and is presided over by a gentleman who is thoroughly skilled in this department of medicine. His clinics abound in material, and afford ample opportunity for becoming familiar with the treatment of all diseases of these organs. Numberless operations are performed in the presence of the class. Each student is afforded opportunity of instruction in all the latest methods of examining these organs, including the use of the ophthalmoscope and otoscope.

The use of the laryngoscope will be taught, and will be practically exemplified in the study of Diseases of the Throat.

GYNÆCOLOGY.

In addition to the regular didactic course, Gynæcological Clinics are held weekly. Diagnosis by speculum, probe, digital touch, etc., etc., together with the most approved and recognized plans of uterine and intra-uterine treatment, are practiced, and their relative merits discussed before the class. Advanced students are requested to practice these manipulations themselves, and when desired are put in regular attendance upon cases.

VENEREAL DISEASES.

The Professor of Surgery will utilize the immense amount of clinical material in these diseases, by special lectures, selecting cases for demonstration to the class.

MEDICAL CLINICS.

In addition to the special clinics already mentioned, there are GENERAL MEDICAL CLINICS, at which students have opportunity of becoming familiar with the various types of disease. The advanced students have opportunity of themselves investigating disease, in order to confer facility and accuracy of diagnosis. Those desiring it are placed in charge of patients.

Thus it will be seen that *Clinical Medicine* is given that importance it so justly merits. The city of Atlanta affords a rich harvest of meterial for this purpose, and the Professors in charge have by unceasing efforts, made it practically available.

ANATOMY.

Assurances of an abundance of material for practical demonstration and dissection, together with the large and costly selection of plates, manakins, skeletons, etc., insures thorough and practical instruction in this branch. Prof. Armstrong, whose distinguished success as a teacher of anatomy in this College many years ago, is remembered by hundreds of the alumni, residing in almost every State in the Union, will again grace this chair.

THE SCIENGE OF CHEMISTRY is carefully taught, and its facts presented in the most attractive manner by experiments, charts and diagrams.

Physiology will be practically illustrated by microscopic illustrations, models, diagrams and original drawings. The application of physiology to pathology therapeutia and the principles of medicine will be made, so far as practicable in a regular didactic course in this department.

MATERIA MEDICA AND THERAPEUTICS are taught by a gentleman whose long study of the subject has rendered him peculiarly successful in presenting this department of medical science in its proper light.

THE CHAIR OF PRACTICE n ade vacant by the death of the lamented Prof. J. T. Banks, has been filled by the election of Dr. H. V. M. Miller. The eminence and ability of this gentleman, together with his long and su cessful experience as a medical teacher in this and other colleges, render further assurance of his eminent fitness for the place unnecessary.

Examinations are held at intervals during the course by the individual members of the faculty, on the subject of preceding lectures. Only those who desire enter their names on these lists. These examinations serve to impress the subject upon the minds of the sti dents, and have proven of such utility that the Faculty earnestly recommend them.

In short, it is the aim of the Faculty, recognizing the great and rapid strides constantly made at this day in the science of medicine, to bring before the student every possible facility for pregaring himself for the duties that await him in the future.

MUSEUM.

The College Museum is in fine condition and has many rare specimens. Alumni and friends of the College who may possess, or hereafter meet with, curious objects of natural history, or specimens of morbid anatomy, which they do not desire to retain, are requested to send them to the Faculty, who will see to their careful preservation, and due credit will be given to the donors. On application, jars with preserving fluids, when necessary, will be furnished for shipping, if in reach of an express office.

PRIZES.

The Faculty offer a pocket case of surgical instruments to the student who, at the examination for his degree, has attained the highest general proficiency in his studies.

Professor J. G. Westmoreland offers a medical case for the best thes's on the action of remedies.

Professor W. F. Westmoreland offers a transfusion apparatus to the student for the best examination in his department. Professor Taliaferro offers an obstetrical forceps for the best examination on obstetrics and diseases of women.

Professor Calhoun offers a prize of an ophthalmoscope (Liebrich's) to the student who presents the best report of the eye and ear clinic.

Professor Wm. Abram Love offers a medical case for the best essay on the ne rvous and vascular relations of the ovaries and uterus to the general system.

Professor Logan offers a gold medal for the best thesis on the relations of the science of chemistry to medicine.

GRADED COURSE.

(OPTIONAL.)

To those students desiring to lengthen their term of study the following plan is suggested. At the end of his second course, the student to be examined on anatomy, physiology, chemistry and materia medica; having passed these examinations satisfactorily, a certificate to that effect is given. He is thus left with more leisure during his third term, to pursue the study of practice, surgery, obstetrics, and diseases of the eye and ear and is examined only upon those branches at the glose of the term.

The above plan is entirely optional with the student. It is recommended as affording an opportunity for thorough acquirement. There is as yet no charge for the third course other than the graduation fee.

GRADUATION.

The candidate must be twenty-one years of age, of good moral character, and must present to the Dean the requisite evidence of having studied medicine three years, inclusive of attendance upon lectures.

He; must have attended two full courses of lectures in a recognized medical college, the last of which shall have been in this Institution.

He must present to the Dean, by the first of February, a thesis of his own composition and in his own handwriting, on a medical subject. The amount of the graduation fee must be deposited with the thesis; in case of failure to pass a satisfactory examination, the money will be refunded.

A report of any of the clinics will be accepted in lieu of the ordinary thesis.

He must pass a satisfactory examination on anatomy, physiology, chemistry, materia medica, practice and general pathology, obstetrics and diseases of women and children, diseases of eye and ear, and surgery.

ANNUAL COMMENCEMENT. 1879-80.

This was held at DeGive's Opera House, on the evening of March 3d, 1880, before a large and cultured audience. After prayer by Rev. Dr. Gwin, the Dean made the annual report to the Board of Trustees. The degree of Doctor of Medicine was then conferred, in a most impressive manner, upon fifty graduates, by Col. A. W. Mitchell, of the Board. A most eloquent address to the graduates was made by Rev. H. H. Tucker, D.D. Dr. J. A. Hurt, in an interesting address, discharged his duty as Class Valedictorian.

The Dean then announced the successful competitors for the various prizes offered by the Faculty, and these were delivered in a happy manner by Dr. H. V. M. Miller, to the following gentlemen:

To Dr. J. H. McCarty, the Faculty Prize, a case of surgical instruments, for the highest general examination. Honorable mention to be made of Dr. J. A. Hurt, A. Strickland, and L. S. Garner. It was announced that a difference of only one-eighth of one per cent. decided the prize between the two highest competitors.

To Dr. C. C. Maddox, the medicine case offered by Prof J. G. Westmoreland for the best thesis on the action of remedies.

To Dr. J. A. Hurt, the transfusion apparatus offered by Prof. W. F. Westmoreland for the best report of surgical clinic.

To Dr. J. H. McCarty, the case offered by Prof. W. A. Love for the best essay on the nervous and vascular relations of the ovaries and uterus to the general system.

To Dr. L. S. Garner, obstetrical forceps, offered by Prof. Taliaferro for the best examination in obstetrics.

To Dr. J. A. Hurt, the opthalmoscope offered by Prof. Calhoun for the best report of eye and ear clinic.

The Faculty of the Atlanta Medical College, earnestly desiring the advancement and reform of medical education, and believing the above named organization the most efficient method of instituting these needed improvements, have united with that organization, and herewith publish the

ARTICLES OF CONFEDERATION.

ARTICLE I. OF THE FACULTY.

The medical members of the Faculty must be regular graduates or licentiates and practitioners of medicine, in good standing, using the word "regular" in the sense commonly understood in the medical profession. The majority of the members of one faculty shall not constitute the majority of the members of another faculty, unless the sessions of the two schools are held simultaneously.

ARTICLE II. OF TUITION.

Section 1. The scheme of tuition shall provide for a yearly systematic course of instruction, covering the general topics of Anatomy, including Dissections, Physiology, Chemistry, Materia Medica and Therapeutics, Obstetrics, Surgery, Pathology, and Practice of Medicine. The collegiate session, wherein the course is given, shall be understood as the "regular" Session.

Sec. 2. Said Regular Session shall not be less than twenty weeks in duration. This section to go in force at and after the session of 1879-80

Sec. 3. Not more than one regular session—counting the regular session as one of the two courses of instruction required for graduation—shall be held in the same year.

ARTICLE III. REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

No person, whether a graduate in medicine or not, shall be given a diploma of "Doctor of Medicine" who shall not have fulfilled the following requirements, except as hereinafter provided for in Article IV.

1 He must produce satisfactory evidence of good moral character, and of having attained the erg of twenty one.

as hereinafter provided for in Article IV.

1 He must produce satisfactory evidence of good moral character, and of having attained the age of twenty-one

2. He must file a satisfactory certificate of having studied medicine for at least three years under a regular graduate, or licentiate and practioner of medicine, in good standing, using the word "regular" in the sense commonly understood in the medical profession. No candidate shall be eligible for final examination for graduation unless his term of three years' study shall have been completed, or shall expire at a date not later than three months after the close of the final examinations; this clause to take effect at and after the session of 1879-80.

3. He must file the proper official evidence that, during the above-mentioned three years, he has matriculated at some affiliated college or colleges for two regular sessions, and in the course of the same (except as provided in 4), has attended two full courses of instruction on the seven topics mentioned in Article II. But the latter, at least, of the two full courses must have been attended at the college issuing the diploma. No two consecutive courses of instruction shall be held as satisfying the above requirements, unless the time between the beginning of the first course and the end of the second is greater than fifteen months.

4. In case a college shall adopt a systematic graduated scheme of tuition, attendance on the whole of the same shall be equivalent to the requirements mentioned in 3, provided such scheme includes instruction in the seven topics mentioned in Article II, and requires' attendance at at least two yearly Collegiate Sessions of not less than twenty weeks' duration each.

5. The candidate must have passed a personal examination before the Faculty on all seven of the branches of medicine mentioned in Article II.

6. He must have paid in full all college dues, including the graduation fee.

ARTICLE IV. OF HONORARY DEGREES.

An honorary degree of "Doctor in Medicine" may be granted in numbers not exceeding one yearly, to distinguished physicians or scientific men of over forty years of age. But in such case the diploma shall be ar across its face the word "Honorary," in conspicuous character, and the same word shall always be appended to the name of the recipient in all lists of graduates.

ARTICLE V. OF FEES.

Section 1. All fees shall be paid in lawful money, and no promissory notes or promises to pay shall be accepted in lieu of cash for payment of fees.

Sec. 2. No ticket, or other certificate of attendance upon college exercise, shall be issued to any student until the dues for the same shall have been fully paid.

Sec. 3. The established fees for exercises of the regular session, except the matriculation fees, graduation fee, fee for dissections, may be reduced not more than one-half

to graduates of other affiliated colleges of less than three years' standing, and to under-graduates of the same who have already attended two full courses of instruction of the regular session.

SEC 4. The same fees may be remitted altogether to a college's own alumni, to graduates of other affiliated colleges of three years' standing—the three years dating from the time of graduation, and ending at the close of the regular session for which the tickets are given—to under-graduates who have already attended two full courses of the instruction of the regular session, the latter of which, at least, shall have been in the college making the remission, and to theological students, when not candidates for

a diploma.

SEC. 5. The same fees may be reduced or remitted to deserving indigent students, to a number not exceeding five per cent. of the number of matriculants at the previous

regular session of the college.

Sec. 6. Under no circumstances whatever, other than the above, shall the Faculties, or any member of the same, grant, upon their own authority, any remissions or reductions of established fees. And it is distinctly understood and agreed that the Faculties will discountenance and oppose the authorizing by governing boards of the admission of individual students upon other than the regularly established charges for their grade.

SEC. 7. Remission or reduction of fees for other exercises than those of the regular session, return to a student of any moneys after payment of fees, or an appropriation of funds of the college for payment of any student's fees, or part thereof, shall be deemed violation of the provisions of this article in regard to remission or reduction of fees.

ARTICLE VI. OF RECOGNITION OF OTHER COLLEGES.

No college shall admit to the privileges accorded in Articles III and V the students or graduates of any college which, during any period of the student's or graduate's pupilage shall have been excluded from the list of affiliated colleges recognized by the Association.

ARTICLE VII. ADVERTISEMENTS.

No college shall advertise in any other than a strictly medical publication the names of its professors, with their respective chairs.

Resolved, That each confederated college shall publish in its annual circular and catalogue the names of all confederated and affiliated colleges, beginning with their announcements for 1878-79.
