Annual Announcement.

FOR THE YEAR 1880—81.

THE CINCINNATI COLLEGE OF MEDICINE AND SURGERY is one of the oldest Medical Colleges in the West. For over a quarter of a century the school, by the efficiency of its teaching, by its spirit of progress, and by the thorough independence with which it has met and overcome the obstacles continually thrown in the way of advanced medical culture in the West, has held its place as one of the first colleges of the country. This is no boast; it is only an expression of satisfaction coming after years of labor.

It is the universal opinion, that in medical teaching, clinical instruction should have an equal place with didactic lectures, but only large cities can support hospitals and dispensaries where clinical instruction can be given; only large cities furnish the necessary variety of disease for this class of instruction. In cities specialties thrive; and hence in these only the most able teachers in the different branches can be found. In all these respects Cincinnati stands pre-eminent. The Cincinnati Hospital, one of the largest and most complete institutions of its kind in the world, furnishes ample material in all the departments of disease, and clinical lectures are delivered there daily. In addition to these hospital advantages the College maintains a well-conducted Dispensary, where a large number of patients are treated annually. Students are thus made practically familiar with all forms of disease and injury, and when they leave the school they have rather the knowledge of old practitioners than that of recent graduates.

Some members of the Faculty are also members of the Cincinnati Hospital staff, and students of this College will have the benefit of their clinical lectures in that institution.

COLLEGE BUILDING.

THE College Building is situated at 164 and 166 George street, between John and Smith streets, and for comfort and convenience, and general adaptation for all the purposes of a medical college, is unexcelled by any in the country. Centrally located, and convenient to boarding houses, the Cincinnati Hospital, and street railroads, it is nevertheless situated on a quiet, pleasant street, removed from the noise and din of the busy city.

COLLEGE DISPENSARY.

THE Faculty, alive to the importance of clinical teaching, have recently added to the College the large and commodious building adjoining, to be used entirely for clinics.

There are spacious waiting rooms for patients; an excellent operating amphitheatre, and a well adapted lecture room for gynecological cases and special examinations. More than one clinic is conducted at the same time, and students can pass from one clinic room to the other and make personal inspection of, and receive practical instruction in, the examination and treatment of cases in the various departments. During the course of the session almost every variety of medical and surgical disease may be seen. Over ten thousand patients are treated annually in the presence of the class.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

THE PRINCIPLES AND PRACTICE OF MEDICINE are taught by didactic and by clinical lectures, the medical clinic of the college affording ample opportunity for illustrating almost every form of disease treated of in the didactic course. Students will enjoy all possible privileges to examine cases for themselves and acquire practical knowledge in the management of disease.

THE CHAIR OF SURGERY.—The Chair of Surgery aims to give the student a thorough and practical knowledge of surgical operations and manipulation. Minor Surgery is illustrated in the numerous cases of injury, etc., presenting themselves at the Surgical Clinic. A complete series of operations on the cadaver are made before the class. In the Cincinnati Hospital are performed each year all of the grave operations, so that there is comparatively little Operative Surgery which the student does not actually witness.

MATERIA MEDICA AND THERAPEUTICS.—In teaching *Materia Medica* and Therapeutics, the drugs and preparations are exhibited at each lecture, in order that the student may become familiar with their physical properties, but the especial aim is to impart a thorough knowledge of Therapeutics rather than of *Materia Medica* or Pharmacy.

GYNÆCOLOGY.—In the department of Gynæcology, the student is thoroughly instructed in the application of all the means of investigation used in uterine disease.

The clinic room for this department has been especially arranged for demonstrative teaching, and almost every affection treated of in the didactic lectures being here illustrated with cases that constantly crowd this clinic. The advanced students have, under the direction of the professor, the opportunity of making physical examination of patients.

OPHTHALMOLOGY AND AURAL SURGERY.—This chair is filled by Prof. Joseph Aub, oculist to, and lecturer on, Diseases of the Eye and Ear in the Cincinnati Hospital. Students will have, therefore, the advantage of his instruction in that institution, with which he has been connected for nine years, as well as of the didactic and surgical courses at the college.

At the Dispensary Clinic students will have the opportunity of seeing almost every variety of disease of the eye and ear, and of witnessing the principal operations in this department.

A room for Ophthalmoscopic examination has been added to the clinical department of the college.

Prof. Aub will give instruction in the use of the Ophthalmoscope to a limited number of students during the winter.

ANATOMY.—In the department of Anatomy, besides the actual work upon the subject which is carried on before the class during the entire session, there are many auxiliary means of instruction employed, as plates, models, wet and dry preparations, etc.

PRACTICAL ANATOMY.—This branch is taught according to the most approved methods. The Demonstrator is to be found constantly at his post to give the necessary assistance and instruction.

Each student is required to make at least one dissection, and to present to the Faculty a certificate, signed by the Demonstrator, showing that said student has been examined on the anatomy of the part which he has dissected, and that this examination has been satisfactory.

The Dissecting Room, which has recently been greatly enlarged, is open nightly under the charge of the Demonstrator. There is always an abundance of material.

OBSTETRICS.—In the Obstetrical department no effort is spared to render the course of instruction thorough and practical. The lectures are illustrated by diagrams, charts, models, etc., the obstetrical manipulations thoroughly demonstrated, and an opportunity afforded to students to perform upon the manikin and cadaver, under guidance of the professor, all the more important obstetrical operations, and to acquire a practical knowledge of the important art of obstetrical diagnosis. To this end the Faculty have imported direct from Paris the new *rubber manikin* of Profs. Budin and Einard, a wonderful, life-like representation of all the parts involved in parturition.

CHEMISTRY.—The instruction in Chemistry is conducted by recitations, demonstrative lectures and practical work in the laboratory. The topics of the course are as follows—it being assumed that the student understands the first principles of physics, and the mechanics of solids, liquids and gases:

LABORATORY WORK.

The opportunity is given students to pursue the study of Chemistry practically with apparatus in hand. The Laboratory of the College is generously furnished, and affords ample accommodation for all to work. The fee for each course is \$5.

COURSES.

1. The Manipulation of Apparatus and Experiments illustrating Theoretical Chemistry.
2. The Preparation of Medicine.
3. Chemical Analysis.
4. The Separation and Determination of Poisons.
5. The Examinations and Determination of Animal Fluids and Solids.

PHYSIOLOGY.—Physiology is taught by the demonstrative method. The student does not simply listen to a recital of physiological facts, but his interest is excited and memory impressed by abundant employment of models, diagrams, the microscope, physiological apparatus and vivisections wherever these can serve for the better exposition of the subject.

This chair is now filled by Prof. R. B. Davy, whose former experience in teaching physiology, and study in this department while in Europe, gives assurance of a thorough course, according to the most approved modern methods.

The physiological laboratory is well supplied with material, and microscopical, manipulation and histological study can be pursued under the direction of Dr. Gaylord, the Demonstrator. The fee for the laboratory course is \$5.

PATHOLOGY.—The Faculty recognizing the vital importance to the medical student of the present day of a thorough familiarity with Pathological Anatomy, have arranged for a course of lectures on this topic by Reuben A. Vance, M.D. This gentleman, a graduate of the Bellevue Hospital Medical College, formerly an *interne* of Bellevue Hospital, for many years Attending Physician for Diseases of the Nervous System at the Out-Door Department of Bellevue Hospital, and connected in a professional capacity at different times with various other prominent institutions of New York City, has had rare facilities for acquiring information in this department of practical medicine. In the study of Pathology, the student has access to the extensive Museum of the College. There is no want of fresh specimens to illustrate post-mortem appearances.

Professor Wm. A. Rothacker, Pathologist to the Cincinnati Hospital, will, during the term, give a complete course of lectures on Pathological Anatomy in that institution; and will make post-mortem examinations before the class.

MEDICAL JURISPRUDENCE.—A course of lectures will be delivered on this important subject. The demands constantly made upon the profession for information in those matters, where Law and Science combine, has greatly enhanced the importance of

this department. The Faculty have therefore arranged for an unusually thorough and complete exposition of Medical Jurisprudence.

Professor J. B. A. Risk, M. D., LL. D., a gentleman well known in legal and medical circles, and whose vast experience as a medical jurist and happy tact as a medical teacher admirably fit him for the position, has consented to deliver a course of lectures on the mutual relations of Law and Medicine.

The *course* will embrace the consideration of the principles of law applicable to medical men, civil and criminal malpractice, general and medical evidence, expert testimony, insanity, partial insanity, moral insanity, what mental incapacity invalidates a will, coroner's office and inquests, as well as other topics relating to the liberty and property of individuals.

DAILY CLINICS.—Daily Clinics will be conducted at the College Dispensary throughout the year according to the following programme—

Medical Clinic,	Monday and Thursday.

GRADED INSTRUCTION.

By a resolution of the Faculty, students entering the school with the purpose of attending three courses of Lectures, may have, if they desire, their course of instruction graded, so that, each session, they may attend exclusively to the branches of the grade belonging to it, and the examination upon them, if satisfactory, will be final. In such cases, the last examination will be only upon the studies of the third session.

RESIDENT PHYSICIANS OF THE CINCINNATI HOSPITAL.

IN February of each year six students are chosen by a competitive examination from the medical classes of the city for the position of Resident Physician to the Cincinnati Hospital. This place offers to its occupant as great, if not greater, advantages than the Interne's position in the hospitals of Paris.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

1. CANDIDATES for the degree of Doctor in Medicine must have attended two full courses of lectures—the last one in this college.
2. They must have studied medicine for three years under the direction of a regular physician or surgeon, have attained the age of twenty-one years, and be of good moral character.
3. Full certificates attesting these facts must be furnished.

The phrase "regular physician or surgeon" is used in the sense commonly understood in the medical profession. Certificates of preceptorship from Eclectic, Homœopathic or other so-called "irregular" practitioners, will not be received.

4. Each candidate is required to deposit with the Secretary of the Faculty, on or before the first of February, the proper credentials for graduation. Thesis optional.

5. At the close of the session each candidate must pass a personal examination by each member of the Faculty.

6. A certificate from the Demonstrator, that the candidate has been engaged in the study of Practical Anatomy will be required. He must have attended Hospital Clinics, at least one session.

7. The degree will not be conferred on any candidate for graduation who absents himself from the commencement exercises unless by *special permission* of the Faculty.

The Faculty will publicly revoke the diploma of any graduate of this College who shall at any time engage in the practice of any irregular system of medicine.

SPECIAL COURSES.

THERE are many physicians who have been in practice for some years who have had limited opportunity of familiarizing themselves with the more recent advances in Surgery, Practice and Obstetrics, who especially feel the want of a practical knowledge of the operative details of Gynæcology, Ophthalmology, Laryngology, etc. To meet this want the Faculty have arranged to give special operative courses in all the practical departments. Thus enabling physicians to acquire in a short time a thorough knowledge and experience in such branches as they desire.

POST-GRADUATE COURSE.

GRADUATES of this college are admitted without fee to all the regular clinical and didactic lectures of the college.

Graduates of other regular medical colleges, who will be of three years standing at the end of any given winter session, are admitted to all the lectures of such session upon payment of the matriculation fee.

Graduates of other regular medical colleges of less than three years standing can be admitted to all the regular clinical and didactic lectures of this college upon payment of forty dollars.

EXPENSES OF LIVING.

THE expenses of living in Cincinnati are perhaps less than in any other city in the United States, but will, of course, vary according to the views and habits of students.

Good board, including fire and light, may be had at the present time at from \$3 to \$6 per week. When students form clubs, rent furnished rooms, and mess together, they can live comfortably for about half what it will cost to board. Students arriving in the city can send their luggage directly to the college, where it will be safely cared for by the Janitor, until they can secure boarding-places. A list of boarding-houses in the vicinity of the college is provided; and the Janitor is prepared to secure satisfactory accommodation to suit the wishes of the students without any delay.

PRIZES.

THE Faculty will offer valuable prizes for proficiency in their respective departments.

The names of those to whom the prizes are awarded will be announced at the Annual Commencement.

REGULAR SESSION.

THE next Regular Session opens October 4, 1880, and continues until the latter part of February, 1881. There will be a Preliminary Course commencing September 6, 1880. Students are urged to attend this course, as special instruction is given on subjects which cannot be so fully treated of during the regular session.

Announcement of Spring Session

FOR 1881.

THE SPRING SESSION will commence March 14th, and continue for eight weeks.

The session will consist of a PRACTICAL and CLINICAL COURSE, and in addition SPECIAL OPERATIVE COURSES on the following topics, viz:

Surgery, Prof. Bramble; *Gynæcology*, Prof. Miles; *Physical Diagnosis*, Prof. Trush; *Practical Chemistry*, Prof. Stuntz; *Surgical Anatomy*, Prof. Rothacker; *Diseases of the Eye and Ear*, Prof. Aub; *Experimental Therapeutics*, Prof. Isham; *Obstetrics*, Prof. Underhill; *Diseases of the Larynx*, Prof. Davy; *Diseases of the Rectum*, Dr. Vance.

The plan of giving *Special Operative Courses* is a *new and important feature* of the session—having for its object the training of physicians and advanced students in the physical examination of patients and the performance of the usual and important operations. A limited number will form each class—so every member will be drilled in the manipulative management of cases, and thus acquire that practical knowledge that could not be gained during the winter course of lectures.

The Special Courses being elective, the student is at liberty to choose any department he is desirous of pursuing, and paying only for the course so selected.

The *Practical Course* will consist of daily lectures and demonstrations upon the subjects in medicine and surgery, which are of the greatest practical value to the student.

Daily Clinics will be held at the College Dispensary, where almost every variety of medical and surgical disease may be seen, thus affording ample opportunity of demonstrating the subjects taught by actual cases presented before the class.

The *Dissecting Room* will be open nightly under the charge of the Demonstrator of Anatomy.

In connection with this course there will be a course of *Clinical Lectures* at the Cincinnati Hospital.

RULES GOVERNING THE
American Medical College Association.

ARTICLES OF CONFEDERATION.

ARTICLE I.—OF THE FACULTY.

The medical members of the Faculty must be *regular* graduates or licentiates and practitioners of medicine, in good standing, using the word "regular" in the sense commonly understood in the medical profession.

ARTICLE II.—OF TUITION.

SECTION 1. The scheme of tuition shall provide for a yearly systematic course of instruction covering the general topics of Anatomy, including dissections, Physiology, Chemistry, Materia Medica, and Therapeutics, Obstetrics, Surgery, Pathology and Practice of Medicine. The collegiate session wherein this course is given shall be understood as the "regular" session.

SECTION 2. Said Regular Session shall not be less than twenty weeks in duration. This section to go in force at and after the session of 1879-80.

SECTION 3. Not more than one regular session, counting the regular session as one of the two courses of instruction required for graduation, shall be held in the same year.

ARTICLE III.—REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

No person, whether a graduate in medicine or not, shall be given a diploma of "Doctor of Medicine," who shall not have fulfilled the following requirements, *except* as hereinafter provided for in Article IV.:

1. He must produce satisfactory evidence of good moral character, and of having attained the age of twenty-one years.
2. He must file a satisfactory certificate of having studied medicine for at least three years under a *regular* graduate or licentiate and practitioner of medicine, in good standing, using the word "regular" in the sense commonly understood in the medical profession. No candidate shall be eligible for final examination for graduation, unless his term of three years' study shall have been completed or shall expire at a date not later than three months after the close of the final examinations; this clause to take effect at and after the session of 1879-80.

3. He must file the proper official evidence that during the above-mentioned three years he has matriculated at some affiliated college or colleges, for two regular sessions, and in the course of the same (except as provided in) has attended two full courses of instruction on the seven topics mentioned in Article II. But the *latter*, at least, of the two full courses must have been attended at the college issuing the diploma; No two consecutive courses of instruction shall be held as satisfying the above requirements unless the time between the beginning of the first course and the end of the second is greater than fifteen months.

4. In case a college shall adopt a systematic graduated scheme of tuition, attendance on the whole of the same shall be equivalent to the requirements mentioned in 3, *provided* such scheme includes instruction in the seven topics mentioned in Article II, and requires attendance at at least two yearly regular Collegiate Sessions of not less than twenty weeks' duration each.

5. The candidate must have passed a personal examination before the Faculty on all seven of the branches of medicine mentioned in Article II.

6. He must have paid in full all college dues, including the graduation fee.

ARTICLE IV.—OF HONORARY DEGREES.

An honorary degree of "Doctor in Medicine" may be granted in numbers not exceeding one yearly, to distinguished physicians or scientific men of over forty years of age. But in such case the diploma shall bear across its face the word "Honorary," in conspicuous characters, and the same word shall always be appended to the name of the recipient in all lists of graduates.

ARTICLE V.—OF FEES.

SECTION 1. All fees shall be paid in lawful money, and no promissory notes or promises to pay shall be accepted in lieu of cash for payment of fees;

SECTION 2. No ticket, or other certificate of attendance upon college exercises, shall be issued to any student until the dues for the same shall have been fully paid.

SECTION 3. The established fees for the exercises of the regular session, except the matriculation fee, graduation fee, fee for dissections, may be reduced not more than one-half to graduates of other affiliated colleges of less than three years' standing, and to undergraduates of the same who have already attended two full courses of the instruction of the regular session.

SECTION 4. The same fees may be remitted altogether to a college's own alumni, to graduates of other affiliated colleges of three years' standing—the three years dating from the time of graduation and ending at the close of the regular session for which the tickets are given—to undergraduates who have already attended two full courses of the instruction of the regular session, the latter of which, at least, shall have been in the college making the remission, and to theological students, when not candidates for a diploma.

SECTION 5. The same fees may be reduced or remitted to deserving indigent students, to a number not exceeding five per cent. of the number of matriculants at the previous regular session of the college.

SECTION 6. Under no circumstances whatever, other than the above, shall the Faculties, or any members of the same, grant, *upon their own authority*, any remissions or reductions of established fees. And it is distinctly understood and agreed that the Faculties will discountenance and oppose the authorizing by governing Boards of the admission of individual students upon other than the regularly established charges for their grade.

SECTION 7. Remission or reduction of fee for other exercises than those of the regular session, return to a student of any moneys after payment of fees, or an appropriation of funds of the college for payment of any student's fees, or part thereof, shall be deemed violation of the provisions of this article in regard to remission or reduction of fees.

ARTICLE VI.—OF RECOGNITION OF OTHER COLLEGES.

No college shall admit to the privileges accorded in Articles III and V the students or graduates of any college which, during any period of the student's or graduate's pupilage shall have been excluded from the list of affiliated colleges recognized by the association.

ARTICLE VII.—AMENDMENTS.

Amendments to these Articles shall be proposed and adopted in the manner prescribed for amendments to the Constitution.
