MUSEUM AND CABINETS.

The Wistar and Horner Museum, which was founded nearly One Hundred Years ago, and has been annually augmented, is unequalled in the United States. It contains specimens of the normal and the morbid anatomy of every part of the human body, as well as a large number of preparations in comparative anatomy, and an extensive collection of artistic models, all of which are used in illustrating the several courses of lectures delivered in the Medical Department. The ticket of matriculation in this Department entitles the holder to admission to the Museum, which is open on Wednesday and Saturday of each week, from 9 to 12 A. M., throughout the session.

The Cabinet of the Professor of Theory and Practice of Medicine, collected by Dr. George B. Wood while he held that chair, and generously placed by him at the service of his successors, contains an extensive series of drawings, and abounds in wet preparations, and models in wax, and other materials, which together form a collection unrivalled in extent and value, illustrating diseases of the internal organs and of the skin.

DEMONSTRATIVE AND CLINICAL INSTRUCTION.

During the Spring and Summer students of the Medical Department are entitled to attend the Lectures of the Auxiliary Faculty on subjects which form a scientific basis for medicine, or illustrate several of its branches. For a month before the opening of the Winter Session Clinical and Demonstrative lectures are delivered on Physical Diagnosis, Microscopy, Diseases of the Eye and Ear,

and other subjects, without additional fees. The Medical Faculty cannot too strongly urge upon medical students the great advantages of these courses, which are so arranged as not to interfere with the lectures and the bedside instructions given at the several hospitals.

UNIVERSITY CLINICS.

The system of daily clinical lectures and demonstrations at the University, which was inaugurated last year, has proved eminently successful. Under the control of the Professor of Surgery, Dr. D. HAYES AGNEW, and of the Lecturer on Clinical Medicine, Dr. William Pepper, assisted by the gentlemen whose names appear elsewhere, a very large number of cases have been treated before the class, and all the most important operations in surgery amply illustrated. The Faculty have every reason to believe that the students estimate very highly the advantages of these Clinical courses.

UNIVERSITY DISPENSARY.

The Dispensary of the University is open daily throughout the year, and is attended by a large number of patients. It affords an excellent opportunity for each student to acquire skill in the diagnosis and treatment of disease under a competent instructor.

SURGICAL WARDS.

For the accommodation of such persons as require Surgical treatment, Wards, with proper attendants, are provided in the College Building. Capital operations, as Lithotomy, Amputation, &c., are frequently performed, and the patients are subsequently dressed and prescribed for in the presence of the class.

A very brief synopsis of what has been done in the short space of one year, since the introduction of the present plan, will furnish some idea of the richness and importance of the Clinical System of instruction.

In the Medical Department over fifteen hundred cases were treated.

In the Surgical Department, including General, Oral, and Ophthalmic Surgery, Twenty-five hundred cases were treated, and over Four hundred operations done for almost every variety of Surgical diseases, such as Lithotomy; Amputation; Extirpation of Tumors from various regions of the body; Trephining; Excisions of Nerves; Resection of the Jaws; Cleft Palate; Cataract; Perineal Sections; Dressing of Fractures, and Reduction of Luxations.

HOSPITALS AND HOSPITAL CLINICS.

Clinical Instruction (without fee) is given throughout the year at the Philadelphia Hospital, which contains 900 beds, and is the only large hospital in America in which all the members of the Medical Staff are continuously on duty. Clinical lectures on Medicine, Surgery, and the Diseases of Women and Children are delivered there twice a week. The Professor of Theory and Practice lectures on Clinical Medicine in this Institution throughout the winter. Lectures on Clinical Surgery at the Pennsylvania Hospital are delivered twice a week during the whole year by the several members of the Medical Staff. Among the other Hospitals where Clinical Instruction is given, and which are

accessible to students, may be mentioned: The Episcopal, Wills (Eye Hospital), Children's, Lying-in, St. Joseph's, St. Francis', German, and Jewish Hospitals.

The following DISPENSARIES are also available for students, many of whom are systematically instructed in practice by the visiting physicians: The PHILADELPHIA, The SOUTHERN, The NORTHERN, and The MOYAMENSING DISPENSARIES.

Numerous appointments of Resident Physicians are made annually in the different Hospitals of the city, and are open to competition by the graduates of the school.

PRACTICAL ANATOMY.

The Dissecting Rooms of the University are open throughout the year (except July and August), under the superintendence of the Professor of Anatomy, and the Demonstrator. Many improvements have been made, which will aid the student in the prosecution of his studies, and will greatly tend to the preservation of his health and comfort. Every table has a stone top, which can be kept perfectly clean, marble wash-stands have been erected, and private closets built, in which students may place their instruments, books, and clothing, and keep them safe and clean. The height of the room has been nearly doubled, extensive skylights introduced, and the ventilation rendered as perfect as possible. The preservation and injection of the cadaver have been accomplished with great success by new and better methods. As dissection is now legalized in Pennsylvania, the cost of material is very small.

PRACTICAL SURGERY.

The Operating Room is open during the Session, under the supervision of the Professor of Surgery, and his Assistants, Every student is here thoroughly instructed and practically trained in the application of bandages and surgical apparatus, and in the performance of operations upon the cadaver. Instruments, splints, and bandages are supplied free of cost.

REGULATIONS OF THE MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

The rules for Graduation in Medicine are as follows:-

I. The candidate must have attained the age of twenty-one years, have applied himself to the study of Medicine for three years, and been, during that time, the private pupil for two years, at least, of a respectable practitioner of Medicine.

II. The candidate must also have attended two complete courses of the following Lectures in this Institution:—

Theory and Practice of Medicine.

Anatomy,

Materia Medica and Pharmacy,

Chemistry,

Surgery,

Obstetrics, and the Diseases of Women and Children,

Institutes of Medicine.

III. Medical students who have attended one complete course in a respectable Medical School, where the attendance on two complete courses is necessary to a degree, where the same branches are taught as in this, and which is placed upon the *ad eundem* of this school, are permitted to become candidates by an attendance here for one full course; the rules of graduation being in other respects observed. They are also exempted from the payment of fees upon attending a second term.

IV. The candidate, at the time of his application, must deliver to the Dean of the Medical Faculty a Thesis, composed by himself, on some medical subject. This Thesis is referred to one of the Professors, who shall examine the candidate upon it, and make his report thereon to the Medical Faculty.

V. Candidates who have passed their examination, and in other respects complied with the regulations, are to be reported by the Dean to the Provost, who will communicate such report to the Board of Trustees, in order that, if approved by them, their mandamus be issued for conferring the Degree.

The branches of Natural History, forming the subjects of the three Professorships first named, will be taught mainly in reference to their medical relations.

All students who have matriculated in the Medical Department, and have taken the tickets of two of the Medical Faculty, have the right of admission to the lectures. Attendance upon these lectures is not compulsory upon the students in the Medical Department.

The several courses will each consist of at least thirty-four lectures, to be delivered, at hours fixed by the Faculty, three times a week during the months of April, May, and June, commencing on Monday, March 25, and ending on the last Saturday in June.

The Degree of Doctor of Philosophy will be conferred upon those medical graduates who shall have attended two courses of lectures, and have passed a satisfactory examination thereon by the Faculty. To such, a Diploma will be granted by the University.

SECOND ANNUAL MEETING.

THE first Anniversary of the Society was celebrated with an entertainment, in the Hall of the University, on the evening before Commencement day. This celebration, which was conducted by the Executive Committee, was attended by the new members from the graduating class, as invited guests, and by a large number of the Alumni, through whose subscriptions to the collation fund the expense had been defrayed, without cost to the Society.

The gratifying success of the first Anniversary Celebration has confirmed the intention to continue the custom, by arrangement for a similar entertainment, to be given on the evening

before the Commencement of 1872.

The second Annual Meeting of the Society was held March 14, 1871, in the Hall of the Medical Department; Prof. Joseph Carson, Vice-President, in the chair, and Dr. Geo. P. Oliver, Secretary.

After approval of the minutes of the original meeting, including that for organization, held directly after the previous Commencement, the Annual Report of the Executive Committee, and

the statement of the Treasurer, were read and accepted.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Annual Report, the Society then authorized and requested the Executive Committee "to make such arrangements as may be deemed best to secure local secretaries throughout the country, for the purpose of increasing the membership of the general Alumni Society, and of establishing local Alumni Societies."

The Executive Committee, under similar recommendation, was further authorized to "institute one or more Annual Prizes, of One Hundred Dollars each, to be awarded, under regulations to be determined by the Faculty in conference with the Committee,

to deserving members of the graduating classes."

The following amendments of the Constitution were then

agreed to, as proposed by the Executive Committee.

1st. For the institution of an annual oration to be delivered at the Annual Meeting of the Society; the orator to be elected at the previous Annual Meeting as a regular officer of the Society; the Executive Committee to appoint, whenever practicable, an alternate or substitute, in case of declination, resignation, or other anticipated failure of the orator elect.

2d. To change the time of Annual Meeting from the afternoon of Commencement day, to the afternoon before Commencement day.

3d. For the mode of appointment of a Nominating Committee to prepare and publish, in proper form and time, a printed list of

officers, for use in balloting at the annual election.

A resolution was then unanimously adopted, requesting the President of the Society, in concurrence with the Executive Committee, to appoint a Committee to assist the Faculty in establishing a UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL, and to collect funds for that purpose.

The desirability of publishing a Catalogue of the Wistar and Horner Museum, and a new list of the Medical Alumni, was dis-

cussed, and referred to the Executive Committee.

The annual election was then ordered; and the meeting adjourned with the following

NOTICE.

In accordance with the action of the Society at the late Annual Meeting, the Executive Committee would earnestly invite their fellow-Alumni throughout the country, who have not yet joined the Society, to forward their names (with references to local organizations, or to the American Medical Association, as to standing) to Dr. Chas. T. Hunter, Corresponding Secretary, or to Prof. R. E. Rogers, of the University of Pennsylvania. The Executive Committee would also be glad to receive nominations of Alumni, for appointment as local Secretaries, to organize local Societies and to obtain additional members for the general Society.

The participation of the graduates in the Anniversary Celebration—not only with subscriptions, but with their personal attendance—is also earnestly invited, in the interests of professional good-fellowship, as well as of the Society of the

Alumni and of our honored Alma Mater.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I. -NAME.

The name of this Association shall be "The Society of the Alumni of the Medical Department of the University of Pennsylvania."

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object of the Society shall be to sustain and advance the interests and influence of the Medical Department of the University of Pennsylvania, by the promotion of sentiments of general brotherhood and amity among the graduates, and by aiding in all efforts to elevate the standard of medical education, and to extend the progress of medical science and art.

ARTICLE III. - OFFICERS.

- Sect. 1. The officers of the Society shall be a President, four Vice-Presidents, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, an Orator, and an Executive Committee.
- Sect. 2. The President, or, in his absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, in the order of seniority, shall preside at all meetings of the Society, and decide all questions of order.
- Sect. 3. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to answer all letters addressed to the Society, to open and maintain such correspondence as may tend to advance its interests, and to keep a record thereof, subject to the directions of the Society.
- Sect. 4. The Recording Secretary shall keep correct minutes of the proceedings of all meetings of the Society, and a list of members eligible to office; and shall give notice of the stated and special meetings.
- Sect. 5. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys of the Society, keep correct accounts of the receipts and expenditures, pay all orders allowed by the Executive Committee, and exhibit an accurate statement of his receipts and payments at the stated meetings, and whenever called upon by the Executive Committee.
- Sect. 6. The Executive Committee shall be composed of twenty members, of whom four shall be graduates of at least ten years' standing, and one from each of the last three graduating classes. The duty of the Executive Committee shall be to execute all measures which may be confided to them by the Society. They shall have charge of all matters of finance, and of all business of the Society not otherwise provided for. They shall keep regular minutes of their proceedings, which shall be open at all times to the inspection of the officers and members of the Society; and shall make report thereof to the annual meetings of the Society. They shall have power to make rules for their own regulation; and may supply all vacancies which may happen in their body between the times of meeting of the Society. The Executive Committee shall have power to appoint an alternate or substitute for the Orator for the year, in case of the declination, resignation, or decease of said Orator.
- Sect. 7. The officers of the Society shall be ex-officio members of the Executive Committee.
- Sect. 8. The Orator shall deliver, at the annual meeting succeeding his election and directly after the action on the minutes, an appropriate discourse to the Society; or, in case of declination or inability to perform the duty, he shall so inform the Executive Committee, as soon as practicable after his election and not later than thirty days previous to the anniversary for which he may have been elected.

ARTICLE IV .- ELECTIONS.

- Sect. 1. The first election for officers shall be held immediately after the adoption of the Constitution; and subsequent elections shall be held at the annual meetings herein provided for.
- Sect. 2. The elections for officers shall be by ballot; unless when—by unanimous consent of the members present at any stated meeting—the Society may agree to hold them $viv\hat{u}$ voce.
- Sect. 3. No member shall be permitted to vote until he shall have signed the Constitution, and paid his annual contribution. And no member of over one year's standing—unless he be a life-member—shall be permitted to vote unless he has paid his dues for the preceding year.
- Sect. 4. A Nominating Committee, to consist of five members of the Society, of whom three members shall constitute a quorum, shall be appointed by the Executive Committee at the stated meeting in February, or within ten days thereafter; and said Nominating Committee shall agree upon a ticket of officers for election; which ticket shall be printed, and made public at the Hall of the University not less than ten days before the annual meeting; and copies of said ticket shall be furnished to the legal voters of the Society in such manner and time on the day of the election, as may enable them to make such alteration as they may prefer before depositing their votes.

ARTICLE V .- MEMBERS.

- Sect. 1. The members shall consist of graduates of the Medical Department of the University of Pennsylvania.
- Sect. 2. Any graduate in good standing may become a member of this Society by signing the Constitution, and paying to the Treasurer the sum of one dollar.
- Sect. 3. Honorary members may be elected at any stated meeting of the Society.
- Sect. 4. Any member of the Society who has paid his annual assessments for five years, upon paying the sum of five dollars, and any other graduate in good standing, upon paying the sum of ten dollars—each in lieu of the annual dues—may become a life-member of the Society; the funds arising from such payments to be invested for the benefit of the Society.

ARTICLE VI.-MEETINGS.


- Sect. 1. The annual meetings of the Society shall be held on the anniversaries hereinafter appointed.
- Sect. 2. Special meetings may be called by the President on the application of any two members of the Executive Committee.
- Sect. 3. Nine members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- Sect. 4. The annual commencement-day of the Medical Department, or the day previous thereto, shall be considered the anniversary of the Society; upon which there shall be such celebration as may from year to year be considered expedient.

ARTICLE VII .- PAYMENTS.

- Sect. 1. Every member shall, on signing the Constitution, pay into the hands of the Treasurer the sum of one dollar, which shall be his first annual contribution; and there shall be an annual contribution of one dollar.
- Sect. 2. Any member who shall for two successive years decline the payment of his annual assessment shall be de facto dropped from the list of members.

ARTICLE VIII .- AMENDMENTS.

Sect. 1. Amendments may be made to this Constitution at any stated meeting of the Society, by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present; provided, that due notice has been given in the public papers of the proposal to amend.
