### Lecture Capture Technology

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**Lecture capture technology** is used to digitally capture all or part of lectures, classes, presentations with the purpose of making the content available to students anywhere, anytime for their review. Lecture capture is a standard practice: Based on 2011 GIR survey results of the 73 schools that responded 70 schools are already using the technology; remaining 3 will be using within 24 months of survey date.

#### Advantages

- Anytime, anywhere learning
- Students can review material at their own pace
- Recording at the desktop of mini-lectures provides active learning opportunities
- Can be repurposed for use in other training activities
- Flexibility to reuse previous captures in the event of staff/class emergency
- Accommodates special needs learners

#### Disadvantages

- Requires new resources and policies
- Faculty concerned with student attendance
- Represents a change in culture – alters the role of the lecture in the curriculum

#### Technical Considerations

- System integration (e.g. local ID support, LMS)
- File formats/compression
- Storage of captured lectures and archival duration
- Hosting onsite or offsite?
- Automation of capture
- Post editing support

#### Cost Considerations

- Capture and storage systems
- System integration costs
- Staff time to edit videos
- Archival storage
- Support staff
- Closed captioning

#### Student Considerations

- Available file formats/media player compatibility for playback
- Ability to download
- Mobile device playback
- Ability to do high-speed playbacks
- Ability to skip parts of lectures
- Reliability

#### Other Issues

- Faculty “opt out” option
- Copyrighted material conflicts
- HIPAA content in lectures
- Restricting access/downloads
- Reporting on usage statistics
- Accessibility (closed captioning support, etc.)
- Reduced in-person interaction
