Eric Bass, MD, MPH, FACP

Dr. Bass is a Professor of Medicine with joint appointments in Health Policy and Management, Epidemiology, and Nursing at the Johns Hopkins University. He attended Duke University for college and medical school, and received his residency training in internal medicine and an MPH degree from the University of Pittsburgh. He completed a fellowship in general internal medicine at the Johns Hopkins University, and joined the faculty in 1989.

Dr. Bass is an expert in evidence-based medicine, and is devoted to assessing the effectiveness, safety, and costs of medical and surgical management strategies. He has been a Director of the Johns Hopkins Evidence-based Practice Center since 1997. He also serves as Co-Director of a research facilitating team for the Johns Hopkins Community Health Partnership, a multidisciplinary program that was funded by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

His teaching focuses on medical student education at the interface between medicine and public health, serving as a Director of two medical school courses - Foundations of Public Health, and the Scholarly Concentration in Public Health and Community Service. He was the Director of the General Internal Medicine Fellowship for 15 years. He enjoyed a 5-year term as the Editor of the Journal of



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General Internal Medicine, and was the founding Editor-in-Chief of a journal dedicated to community-based participatory research called Progress in Community Health Partnerships. He continues to be a practicing general internist, and was honored to serve as the President of the Society of General Internal Medicine in 2013-2014.
