FRAHME webinar explores medicine during the holocaust

The AAMC will host a webinar on Jan. 26 on 12-1:30 p.m. ET, "<u>Medicine During the Holocaust and</u> <u>Its Contemporary Relevance: Perspectives from Health Professions Students</u>," as part of its <u>Fundamental Role of the Arts and Humanities in Medical Education (FRAHME) Initiative</u>. Featuring presentations by Hedy S. Wald, PhD, Alpert Medical School of Brown University, and Sabine Hildebrandt, MD, Harvard Medical School, the presentation will be followed by a panel discussion with health professions learners from four countries. David J. Skorton, MD, AAMC president and CEO, will provide opening remarks. This webinar will provide an opportunity to use the humanities – specifically the study of history – for critical reflection on the role of medicine in the Holocaust and its relationship to issues of diversity, equity, and inclusion in contemporary times.

Registration is now open for the Restorative Justice in Academic Medicine (RJAM) Facilitator Training

This in-person program welcomes faculty and staff from medical schools, teaching hospitals, and allied health professionals who would like to learn a relational framework that can help them navigate difficult issues (e.g., academic integrity, campus climate, Title IX, DEI, misconduct). They will also learn how to respond to instances of individual or communal harm in ways that support active accountability, deeper understanding, shared decision making, and the prevention of future harms. Additionally, this workshop will help practitioners develop the skills to create more supportive, inclusive, and resilient learning communities while fostering a sense of belonging for all stakeholders. The training is scheduled for February 22 – 24, 2023 at AAMC Headquarters in Washington, DC.

New AAMC data show diversity increases at medical schools in 2022

The number of Black, Hispanic, and women applicants and enrollees continued to increase at U.S. medical schools in the 2022-23 academic year, according to data released by the AAMC. This year, the number of medical school applicants returned to pre-pandemic levels, after the 2021-2022

academic year data revealed a record-setting and atypical 18% increase of medical school applicants during the early months of the COVID-19 pandemic. Due to this unprecedented increase during the onset of the public health crisis, the AAMC compared data from the 2022-23 academic year with the 2020-21 academic year for this annual data release. Using this comparison, the data shows that total enrollment grew by 3%. Specifically, the number of students applying to medical school increased by 4% from 2020-21 to 2022-23, and the number of first-year enrollees (matriculants) was up 2% from 2020-21.

AAMC responds to Washington Post opinion piece on standardized testing in medical school admissions

In a <u>letter to the editor</u> of *The Washington Post*, David J. Skorton, MD, AAMC president and CEO, and Gabrielle V. Campbell, AAMC chief services officer, address inaccuracies in a <u>recent opinion</u> <u>piece</u> examining the use of the MCAT exam in medical school admissions. "Every medical school sets its own criteria for selecting the students who will contribute to its mission and successfully complete rigorous medical school curriculums. The AAMC does not — and cannot — mandate whether or how medical schools use the MCAT exam in their admissions processes," they write. "A 'pass/fail' score would disproportionately affect disadvantaged applicants who have strong qualifications but lower MCAT scores, and it would undermine the unique admissions priorities of different medical schools."

Opinion: To Boost Equity, Medical Care Must Act at the Organizational, Population and Policy Levels

In a new opinion piece published in *U.S. News and World Report*, Philip Alberti, PhD, founding director of the AAMC Center for Health Justice, asserts that medical care can help communities attain health equity, noting that clinicians and health care providers must take meaningful action on multiple fronts to boost overall well-being "A medical care organization that prioritizes internal equity provides a model that helps ensure all patient populations it serves will be treated equitably and with respect."

AAMC statement on year-end legislation

AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, and Chief Public Policy Officer Danielle Turnipseed, JD, MHSA, MPP, issued a statement upon the release of text for the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023, that would fund the federal government through fiscal year 2023. The legislative package contains provisions that will support patients, learners, scientists, teaching hospitals, faculty physicians, and other health care providers, including funding for the National Institutes of Health and Health Resources and Services Administration workforce programs and provisions that will expand funding for Medicare-supported graduate medical education, among other priorities.

Leadership plenary addresses from Learn Serve Lead 2022: The AAMC Annual Meeting

Transcripts of the leadership plenary addresses that were delivered during <u>Learn Serve Lead 2022</u> by AAMC Board Chair Kirk A. Calhoun, MD, and AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, have been published. While lauding academic medicine's extraordinary response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Skorton identifies four problems that still plague the nation's health care system but are within the power of academic medicine to address. During the chair's address, Calhoun spoke about the goal of having medical school graduates reflect our communities as an important component of the AAMC strategic plan.
