AAMC webinar to examine the upcoming SFFA v Harvard and UNC SCOTUS decisions

The Supreme Court of the United States (SCOTUS) is considering two cases in which plaintiffs are asking that the race of applicants be shielded from decision-makers in college admissions (SFFA v Harvard, SFFA v UNC). The decisions are expected by the end of June 2023. In preparation, the AAMC is hosting a webinar on Tuesday, March 7 from 2- 3 p.m. ET to lay out the background of the case, introduce potential outcomes, outline considerations for contingency planning, and review critical questions to ask on decision day. This overview is intended for the academic medicine community. AAMC Submits Letter to OSTP on Research Infrastructure, Emergency Clinical Trials

The AAMC submitted a Jan. 27 letter to the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP) in a response to a request for information (RFI) on ways to build clinical research capacity "to ensure that coordinated and large-scale clinical trials can be efficiently carried out across a range of institutions and sites to address outbreaks of disease and other emergencies." This effort is in accordance with the 2022 National Biodefense Strategy and Implementation Plan, the American Pandemic Preparedness Plan, and in partnership with the National Security Council. The AAMC is seeking applications for its Telehealth Equity Catalyst Awards as part of the association's efforts to continue supporting its members' work to advance telehealth equity. AAMC-member institutions will be awarded up to \$15,000 each for programming reflecting innovative contributions to health care delivery that can serve as models for other institutions to address and mitigate the barriers to care associated with telehealth, particularly for communities that are under-resourced with limited access to health care services. Applicants can utilize the funding to assist with sustaining and/or scaling their program or to aid the implementation and evaluation of a new project. The deadline for proposals is March 20. The AAMC Center for Health Justice is seeking an inaugural full-time fellow with relevant subject matter and professional expertise, as well as a passion for the collaborative process of health justice, to support the co-development of its environmental justice portfolio. Under the mentorship and guidance of center leadership, and with input from the Multisector Partners Group and the AAMC CHARGE collaborative, the fellow will have the opportunity to develop key skills, knowledge, and networks while contributing to a national effort to promote health equity through environmental justice. AAMC accepting applications for NEXT Grant program

Applications are now being accepted for the AAMC Nurturing Experiences for Tomorrow's Community Leaders (NEXT) Grant program. Successful applicants will propose projects that seek to develop or enhance health and health care initiatives for learners to confront racism and advance health equity in partnership with local communities. The AAMC will award five grants to member institutions that represent accredited medical schools and teaching hospitals, and Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME)-accredited U.S. residency programs. Grantees will receive up to \$40,000 to support the development or expansion of experiential community-partnered learning opportunities involving medical students, residents, or both. NAM survey on decarbonizing the U.S. health sector

The National Academy of Medicine (NAM) <u>Action Collaborative on Decarbonizing the U.S. Health Sector</u>, of which the AAMC is a member, is conducting a survey to complement a series of five closed focus groups to better understand the perspectives of certain stakeholder groups on decarbonizing the health sector. These focus groups include frontline communities, health professional workers, learners, and educators, as well as patient advocacy organizations and patients. NAM is seeking input from frontline communities, health professional workers, learners, and educators, patient advocacy organizations and patients, and others to help inform the work of the Climate Collaborative. The survey will close on March 10 at 11:59 p.m. ET. <u>Read More</u>

AAMC survey on the use of simulation in medical education

The AAMC has launched a survey of academic medicine institutions to learn more about the use of medical simulation. The survey seeks to inventory the latest simulation technologies, consider the evaluation metrics being used, identify the resources required, and explore how the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted simulation. Every institution's participation is vital to gain an accurate and complete picture of simulation in medical education. A report summarizing the results will be available to the public in late 2023 while institutions that participate will have access to the full results. Study examines the impact of COVID-19 on telehealth use and access to care for underserved populations

A new study published in the *Journal of Health Care for the Poor and Underserved* examines the relationship between access to care and telehealth use before and during the pandemic. The AAMC collaborated with colleagues from The George Washington University Mullan Institute, and the study uses data from the AAMC Consumer Survey. Findings show that that the percentage of people who were always able to get medical care when they needed it was slightly lower in 2020, even as telehealth use rose markedly. Read More

New study on physicians' ability to stay current in medical information and practice

A new study published in *Health Science Reports*, co-authored by AAMC experts, examines continuing medical education (CME) and the extent to which demographic, career, and experiential CME-activity variables were independently associated with physicians' satisfaction with their ability to stay current on medical information and practice. The authors found that significant predictors of respondents who were satisfied included — among others — a surgery specialty, an academic affiliation, and participation in professional meetings and journal-based CME. Respondents who self-identified as a race/ethnicity underrepresented in medicine and were between ages 40 and 49 were less likely to be satisfied. Read More

National Academies report explores anti-racism in STEMM organizations

The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine have released a new consensus study report, *Advancing Anti-racism, Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion in STEMM Organizations*. The report suggests that to increase diversity, equity, and inclusion in science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and medicine (STEMM) fields, higher education institutions and STEMM organizations should go beyond a focus on simply increasing the numeric participation of minoritized racial and ethnic groups and act to change their organizational cultures and environments. Further, the report recommends that organizations follow a multitiered approach — at the leadership, team, and individual levels — and identifies policies and practices that can be implemented at each level. The updated AAMC Faculty Salary Report, used by many in the medical education community as a critical planning resource, is now available. This annual report provides detailed compensation information for faculty in 100 departments and specialties based on a 2022 survey of more than 124,000 medical school faculty. The report also provides decision-makers with the most current and accurate salary data to support strategic planning while also helping individuals make informed decisions about their careers. New study: academic medical centers are linked to better health outcomes at neighboring hospitals

A new AAMC grant-funded study published in JAMA Network Open suggests that academic medical centers are linked to better health outcomes at neighboring hospitals. Researcher-clinicians at <u>Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center</u> found that patients treated at nonteaching hospitals had lower mortality and a greater number of healthy days at home in markets with academic medical centers (AMCs). These associations were greatest in markets with the highest AMC presence, indicating that AMCs may have a positive impact on outcomes for patients treated at neighboring nonteaching hospitals.
