On finding inspiration: "Every single time I've embarked on an educational project that led to scholarship, I'm also learning a lot not just about the field, but about myself and what I can improve on in terms of my writing and in terms of my mentorship...This is about spreading your impact not just in the teaching setting but to the world." — *Grace C. 
Learn how to identify the gaps in the


literature: "With any type of topic, there's this natural history of how it develops...Getting a sense of where your topic...is on this growth curve is helpful in thinking about aligning the type of manuscript that you want to write."


Decide what you want to write: "There's so many different manuscript types that are available in education. We've really moved away from the monolithic research article. I find

that to be really encouraging."

Embrace the power of dissemination: "There's a function for scholarship: It leads to promotion and academic credibility, and that's highly important. But I think what we're really after is making an impact, and that is around disseminating the work that we do."
