University of Arizona

University of Minnesota

conducted a trial that showed hydroxychloroquine has no benefit over a placebo in preventing COVID-19. The results of the randomized trial further showed 40% of patients receiving the drug developed non-serious side effects.





University of Mississippi

Medical Center established a mobile field clinic for patients with non-emergency respiratory illnesses. The clinic is set up in a parking garage and operated on a referral admittance until the pilot phase is complete. The facility can also serve patients with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 with symptoms requiring minor

care.
