### Data of Interest to GBA Members: U.S. Medical School Faculty Tables

Each year, the Faculty Roster publishes the U.S. Medical School Faculty (USMSF) report, a set of tables presenting information about the distribution of full-time faculty by characteristics such as department, rank, degree, tenure status, gender, and race/ethnicity as of December 31 of each year. To access the USMSF tables, log into FAMOUS and go to Reports>Faculty Report>U.S. Medical School Faculty (USMSF) Tables for national data. Go to Reports>Faculty Report>School-Specific USMSF Tables for the corresponding data for your institution. By default, the USMSF tables show full-time faculty counts as of December 31, 2022. To view full-time faculty counts for earlier December 31 snapshots, use the Report Date drop-down to select any snapshot from 1966 onward. Three years of the USMSF tables are available publicly here.

### Data of interest to GBA Members: Medical School Profile System

The Medical School Profile System allows users to produce custom benchmark reports using hundreds of medical school-specific data elements from annual AAMC and Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) data collections covering a range of topics. Topics include medical school revenues, research grants and contracts, financial aid, costs of attendance, faculty counts, and student counts. In addition, users can access a wide variety of national and medical school-specific reports based on data from the AAMC Student Surveys, AAMC compensation surveys, and LCME annual data collections.

Access to the Medical School Profile System is automatically available to a wide variety of medical school staff, including deans and members of the Group on Business Affairs. Individuals can access the Medical School Profile System by logging in with their AAMC username and password at <a href="mailto:systems.aamc.org/mspsreports">systems.aamc.org/mspsreports</a>. ### AAMC statement on court opinion undermining FDA regulatory authority

AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, and Chief Scientific Officer, Ross McKinney, Jr., MD, issued a statement on the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas's decision to invalidate the approval of the drug mifepristone by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and its impact on access to comprehensive reproductive health care. "The AAMC is profoundly concerned by the court opinion that seeks to undermine the FDA's robust and decades-old process for determining whether drugs are safe and effective. The scientific review and regulatory decision-making process is now and must remain the purview of the federal agency that has been given specific authority for the oversight of drugs – not the judicial branch.†Read More

# AAMC letter to the *Washington Post* calls for increased investment in Medicare-supported graduate medical education

The *Washington Post* has published a letter to the editor by AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, in response to a <u>recent editorial</u> calling for Medicare cuts, including to the funds allocated for teaching hospitals. Given the <u>projected physician shortage</u> and the financial pressures AAMC member institutions are facing, Skorton argued that

Congress should increase investment in Medicare-supported graduate medical education and other programs that will strengthen the nation's future physician workforce. Read More

# AAMC, Thalamus announce new collaboration to improve transition to residency

The AAMC and Thalamus have announced a <u>strategic collaboration</u> to accelerate innovation and ease the transition to residency for medical students, medical schools, and residency programs. ### AAMC statement on Senate reintroduction of GME expansion bill

AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, and Chief Public Policy Officer Danielle Turnipseed, JD, MHSA, MPP, issued a statement on the introduction in the U.S. Senate of the Resident Physician Shortage Reduction Act, which aims to increase federal support for physicians' graduate medical education programs. "The AAMC applauds Senators Bob Menendez (D-N.J.), John Boozman (R-Ark.), Susan Collins (R-Maine), and Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-N.Y.) for introducing important, bipartisan legislation to help expand the physician workforce and address the estimated physician shortage of up to 124,000 doctors by the year 2034.†Read More

# AAMC statement on Biden administration's proposal to expand Medicaid coverage to DACA program enrollees

AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, and Chief Public Policy Officer Danielle Turnipseed, JD, MHSA, MPP, issued a statement on the Biden administration's proposal allowing the nearly 600,000 people enrolled in the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program to obtain health coverage through Medicaid or the marketplace. "The AAMC commends President Biden for his plan to expand federal health care programs to DACA recipients, or â€~Dreamers.' These individuals came to the United States as children, built their lives here, make valuable impacts on our communities, and are American in every way except for their immigration status.†Read More

### AAMC joins health professions statement on academic freedom and DEI

The AAMC joined members of the Federation of Associations of Schools of the Health Professions (FASHP) in a statement on ensuring academic freedom and diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) in associations and schools of health professions. The statement notes the importance of "academic freedom as a critical element of successful higher

### Inpatient Prospective Payment System (IPPS) Webinar

The AAMC will be hosting a webinar to discuss the Fiscal Year 2024 Inpatient Prospective Payment System (IPPS) proposed rule. **The webinar will take place on Wednesday**, **May 17**, at **3 PM EDT**.

Some of the proposals that will be discussed include:

- Payment Policies payment updates; disproportionate share hospital and uncompensated care payments; wage index; NCTAP and NTAP; and the Safety Net Index RFI.
- Graduate Medical Education (GME) Rural Emergency Hospitals, Affiliation Agreement Cost Report Instruction Clarification for Prior Year IME Resident-to-Bed Ratio, and Section 5506 Slot Distributions – Round 20.
- Hospital Quality Programs changes to the Hospital Value-Based Purchasing (VBP) Program and Hospital Acquired Condition Reduction Program (HACRP) payfor-performance programs; updates to the Inpatient Quality Reporting (IQR) Program, including measure additions, modifications, and removals; and proposals relating to the Medicare Promoting Interoperability Program (PIP) measuring hospital "meaningful use†of EHRs.

# New AAMC resource collection examines race-conscious admissions in academic medicine

The Supreme Court of the United States is considering two cases in which plaintiffs are asking that the race of applicants be shielded from decision-makers in college admissions (SFFA v. Harvard and SFFA v. UNC). The decisions are expected by the end of June. The AAMC has developed an online resource collection and frequently asked questions to support medical schools ahead of the court's decision. Resources include background on the cases and their potential outcomes, tools and considerations for the admissions community, and scholarly research supporting the benefits of a diverse student body and health care workforce on the health of all. # New AAMC data examines possible impact of Dobbs decision on residency preferences

A new data snapshot developed by the <u>AAMC Research and Action Institute</u> examines the training location preferences of medical school graduates in the United States since the Supreme Court's *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* decision. The authors found that the number of U.S. MD graduates who applied to residency positions during the 2022-23 match cycle decreased by about 2% nationally from the prior year, while the number of applicants to states with abortion bans decreased by 3%. Looking at selected individual specialties, the largest drops in applicants across all states were seen in emergency medicine (-21.4%) and in OB-GYN (-5.2%), with a 10.5% decline in OB-GYN applicants in states that banned abortion. <u>Read More</u>

Skorton, MD, AAMC president and CEO, joined Michael Good, MD, CEO of University of Utah Health and executive dean of the school of medicine, in a conversation about the value that academic medical centers bring to their communities. In a new podcast episode for The Scope, Skorton talked about the importance of academic medical centers in delivering top-quality medical care, conducting cutting-edge research, educating the next generation of health care professionals, and collaborating with communities to solve health care problems. # New article from the AAMC Center for Health Justice examines how health care contributes to population health

A new article by Philip M. Alberti, PhD, <u>AAMC Center for Health Justice</u> founding director, and Heather H. Pierce, JD, MPH, the center's director of policy, published in the 100th anniversary special edition of the <u>Milbank Quarterly</u> focused on the future of population health. The article, "A Population Health Impact Pyramid for Health Care,†explores

how in order to meaningfully impact population health and health equity, health care organizations must take a multipronged approach that ranges from education to value-based purchasing to advocacy. The authors describe seven tiers of action that, while all required, differ in their potential impact. Foundational to all are authentic community partnerships, demonstrating individual and organizational trustworthiness, and a commitment to implementation and accountability. Read More
