Funds Flow Deep Dive: Notes from the World Café Discussion at the 2023 Principal Business Officers' Meeting

At the recent PBO meeting in Vancouver Canada, the first day of the conference focused on funds flow in transition. The first session featured formal presentations by two schools about their funds flow. Following the formal presentations, there was a World Café deep dive where PBOs responded to three different questions and scenarios. Each table was assigned one of three questions. Data of Interest to GBA Members: Tuition and Student Fees Reports

The Tuition and Student Fees Reports are updated at the beginning of each November and are currently comprised of three Excel-based workbooks that present tuition, fees, and health insurance costs reported by accredited medical education programs from academic year 1996-1997 through 2023-2024.

Within each Excel-based workbook, the tab labeled Summary Statistics contains aggregate information organized by academic year, cost type (e.g., tuition), medical school ownership (i.e., public or private), and medical student residence status (i.e., in-state or out-of-state). The tabs labeled by academic year contain tuition and fee costs by medical school, medical school ownership, and medical student residence status. Most of the information in the workbooks come from the AAMC Tuition and Student Fees Questionnaire, but the LCME Part I-B Student Financial Aid Questionnaire is the source of health insurance information from academic years 2002-2003 through 2005-2006.

The tuition, fees, and health insurance costs are the costs published by medical schools. As a result, these costs do not reflect discounts resulting from grants, scholarships, or stipends.

Data of Interest to GBA Members: Chair Retention Reports

There are national and institution-level chair retention reports in <u>FAMOUS</u> under Reports>National Reports and Reports>Chair Reports. These retention reports allow you to

determine how many department chairs from a cohort are retained as of a particular date or after a particular number of years. You can specify a cohort in a number of ways, such as by degree, chair type, appointment start date, gender, and race/ethnicity. Note that the appointment snapshot date defines the initial cohort. For example, a snapshot date of 7/1/2006 will include in the initial cohort all department chairs who had an open appointment on July 1, 2006. One important thing to remember when running retention reports is that retention outcomes can only be generated for chairs who have been around long enough to have been retained. For example, if you are interested in (say) five-year retention outcomes, your initial cohort would need to be those individuals who were chairs in 2018 or earlier (i.e., at least five years ago).

January deadline for several 2024 AAMC Award nominations

The AAMC annually recognizes and celebrates members of the academic medicine community who make significant advances in medical education, patient care, research, community engagement, and diversity in health care. Nominations for the AAMC Award for Excellence in Medical Education, the Award for Distinguished Research in the Biomedical Sciences, the Louis W. Sullivan, MD, Award, and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation David E. Rogers Award, are due Jan. 26, 2024, at 11:59 p.m. ET.

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AAMC Fee Assistance Program expanding with 60% ERAS application discount

In 2024, the AAMC will expand its Fee Assistance Program to residency applicants using the Electronic Residency Application Service® (ERAS®). In a message to the academic medicine community, AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, noted the significant development in the association's work to reduce financial barriers for aspiring physicians. "This expansion will offer financial relief to medical students and demonstrates our ongoing commitment to supporting our learners from premed through residency and beyond."

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AAMC statement on House FY24 Labor-HHS spending bill

AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, and Chief Public Policy Officer Danielle Turnipseed, JD, MHSA, MPP, issued a statement regarding the fiscal year (FY) 2024 Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies (Labor-HHS) bill under consideration by the U.S. House of Representatives. "The AAMC is profoundly concerned over the proposed cuts and restrictions in the House spending bill that would jeopardize the

health of all Americans. We are especially troubled by the steep funding cuts to several agencies, including the National Institutes of Health (NIH), the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and Health Resources Services Administration (HRSA) programs like Title VII and VIII workforce programs, including the Health Careers Opportunity Programs and the Centers of Excellence."

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AAMC joins amicus brief opposing North Dakota ban on under 18 genderaffirming care

The AAMC joined the American Academy of Pediatrics and more than 20 other health organizations in an amicus brief filed Oct. 31 focused on ensuring that all adolescents, including those with gender dysphoria, receive the optimal medical and mental health care they need. The brief provides background on gender identity and gender dysphoria – it details the professionally accepted medical guidelines for treating adolescents with gender dysphoria, the scientifically rigorous process by which the guidelines were developed, and the evidence that gender-affirming care is effective and saves lives.
