

AAMC Webinar - Medical Education Four Years after COVID: Faculty and Staff Engagement

Faculty and staff carrying out the medical education mission at our academic institutions face a number of challenges that may seem new since the COVID-19 pandemic arrived 4 years ago. Expectations for the design and delivery of learning experiences have shifted; many students now devote more of their energy to non-required activities that allow them to stand out during the residency application process; and workplace culture has had to adapt to flexible work arrangements. This webinar is the second in a series looking at the lessons of COVID-19 and how the pandemic has shaped medical education. Through a panel discussion, speakers will explore how the roles of faculty and staff have been reshaped. For example, they will discuss questions like the following: What types of teaching innovations and technology have persisted since the COVID-19 pandemic? What opportunities for professional development and growth exist now for faculty and staff? How are faculty and staff remaining engaged and thriving in today's environment?

Herbert W. Nickens Awards



The AAMC is soliciting nominations for its annual Herbert W. Nickens Awards. These awards honor individuals who advance the educational, societal, and health care needs of racial and ethnic minorities in the United States. We encourage you to disseminate this call for nominations and consider colleagues and students for these awards. The nomination deadlines are listed below.

The <u>Herbert W. Nickens Presidential Award</u> is given to an individual who has made outstanding contributions in promoting justice in medical education and health equities for people in the United States. Nominees may come from the fields of medicine, dentistry, education, law, nursing, public health, or social and behavioral sciences. **Deadline: Friday, March 11, 2024**

The Herbert W. Nickens Faculty Fellowship recognizes an outstanding assistant-level faculty member who has held the assistant professor position for no more than three years. The candidate must have demonstrated leadership in the United States in addressing inequities in medical education and health care; demonstrated efforts in addressing educational, societal, and health care needs of racial and ethnic minorities; and is committed to a career in academic medicine. **Deadline: Friday, April 5, 2024**

The <u>Herbert W. Nickens Medical Student Scholarships</u> are awarded to five outstanding students entering their third year of medical school who have shown leadership in efforts to eliminate inequities in medical education and health care and demonstrated leadership efforts in addressing educational, societal, and health care needs of racial and ethnic minorities in the United States. **Deadline: Friday, April 5, 2024**

Thalamus becomes first medical education technology company to convert to a public benefit corporation

Thalamus, which entered in a collaboration with the AAMC in 2023, has announced its conversion to a public benefit corporation (PBC), further promoting the company's mission by providing a corporate structure that enables balancing public good alongside shareholder interests. The decision marks the first PBC conversion by a technology company supporting medical education. 'The AAMC-Thalamus strategic collaboration has been key in driving improvement in the residency application process,' said David J. Skorton, MD, AAMC president and CEO. 'With this announcement, our organizations are further mission-aligned to drive innovation in medical education and expand and diversify the broader physician workforce.' Read More

AAMC files amicus brief in Supreme Court case regarding mifepristone

The AAMC filed an <u>amicus brief</u> in the U.S. Supreme Court in the case of *U.S. Food and Drug Administration v. Alliance for Hippocratic Medicine,* in which the court will consider a lower court's opinion second-guessing the scientific judgement of the FDA and invalidating approval of the drug mifepristone. The brief, submitted in support of the FDA, argues that the precedent set by allowing the ruling to stand would be not only unprecedented, but dangerous for patients and providers. <u>Read more</u>

AAMC Establishes International Advisory Committee for Artificial Intelligence

Since artificial intelligence (AI) is a global issue that spans the academic medicine community, having a coordinated, consensus-oriented approach to responding to the many opportunities that it offers is critical. The AAMC has convened an International Advisory Committee for AI, in collaboration with several international medical education organizations and institutions (AMEE: The International Association for Health Professions

Education, the International Association of Medical Science Educators [IAMSE], the National University of Singapore [NUS], and the Alliance of Academic Health Centers International [AAHCI]). The AI advisory committee is intended to provide insights and recommendations on AI and is part of a broader effort by the AAMC to support the medical education community in establishing connections and sharing Al innovations in the field. AAMC joins amicus brief in Texas case regarding gender-affirming care for adolescents

The AAMC joined the American Academy of Pediatrics and more than 20 other organizations in an <u>amicus brief</u> filed on Jan. 24 focused on ensuring that all adolescents, including those with gender dysphoria, receive the optimal medical and mental health care they need. The brief, filed in a Texas state appeals court, urged affirmance of several injunctions to protect health care providers from civil and criminal penalties. Read More
