How It Works

APPLICATION AND MATCHING PROCESS

- Individuals apply to become a Mentor and/or Mentee
- A sub-team of GIR leaders from the Steering Committee review applications and match applicants into Circles.
- AAMC staff will first reach out to mentors and then to all participants about their Circle assignments.

CONNECTING WITH YOUR CIRCLE

- Mentor training/orientation call with AAMC and new mentors
- Orientation for all program participants
 with AAMC and new circles
- Initial connections between co-mentors and mentees
- Defining a meeting schedule and preferred communication methods
- Curriculum setting and engagement
 - Convening during the IT in Academic Medicine Conference

- Formal Evaluations
 - Mid-cycle*

The Application Process

Submit an Application – Applications Are Now Open!



The mentor and mentee applications are open on the AAMC GIR website and communications have been and will continue to be sent out to the GIR until applications close.

Welcome Email

After applying and getting matched to a Circle, you will receive a welcome email from the AAMC that contains more information and next steps related to the Mentorship Circle program.

2 Orientations (1 for mentors, 1 for all participants)

A mentor training/orientation will be held virtually once mentors have been identified; then a mentor and mentee (all program participants) orientation will be held virtually to officially launch the Circles. There will also be a meet & greet for Mentorship Circle members to be held at the 2025 IT in Academic Medicine Conference in Minneapolis, May 28-30.

- What are your current areas of experience?
- How would you like to help mentees?







Mentee Application


- Please describe your current role in your organization.

Participant Expectations: Mentors

Encourage the mentees to utilize GIR resources

Introduce mentees to potential ongoing GIR mentors in roles/areas of interest

Proactively engage in your Circle


Flexibility with schedule to accommodate calls

- Work with the mentors to identify key colleagues with similar interests or activities to establish ongoing relationships at the conclusion of their Mentorship Circle Program



Do You Have the Time? A Few Things to Consider

The Commitment:



The commitment can run anywhere from 1-3 hours a month with some months potentially free – it depends on what your Circle decides regarding your schedule, structure, and curricular activities

Things to Consider:

- □ What does your schedule look like September through May?
- □ Can you be flexible?
- □ Is this the right time for you to try this program?
- Will you have enough time and flexibility to show up for your Circle? Keep in mind that your ability to participate has an impact on the overall experience of your Circle as well.

Answers to Some Common Questions

When do we get to meet our Circles?	You will meet your fellow Circle members on or before the Orientation call in August/September 2024. It's possible your co-mentors may reach out to you before Orientation to begin scheduling calls, etc.
How are Circles assigned?	Matching for Circles is primarily based on alignments found during the application review process while taking various factors into consideration (e.g., avoiding institutional overlaps where possible).
What happens at the conclusion of the cycle?	It is the choice of all Circle members how much they want to continue to informally connect with each other, but your official Program involvement concludes with the final evaluation.



Answers to Some Common Questions (Cont'd)

How frequently do Circles convene?	Monthly, or ad hoc, with a minimum of 3 calls throughout the 9-month cycle.
Can Mentors recommit to serve in this capacity for another cycle? What about mentees?	Yes to both!
If I completed the program as a Mentee, can I apply to serve as a Mentor?	Yes! You can participate as a mentor <u>or</u> a mentee any given cycle for as many future cycles as you'd like; however, you can't switch roles mid-cycle.
When can I apply?	Now! Applications are open on the GIR website. For questions, contact gir@aamc.org.
