AAMC statement on Supreme Court decision on EMTALA

AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, issued a statement following the U.S. Supreme Court decision on the Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act (EMTALA). "The AAMC is pleased that the Supreme Court has reinstated the August 2022 district court preliminary injunction. [...] The [association] remains concerned about restrictive state laws that limit access to comprehensive reproductive health care, interfere in the patient-physician relationship, and put pregnant women's health and lives at risk. We will continue to monitor the proceedings in the case as it returns to the lower courts." [Read More](#)

AAMC announces 2024-25 Board of Directors

The AAMC has announced its 2024-25 [Board of Directors](#). The incoming board's term begins Nov. 12, 2024, and will end at the conclusion of Learn Serve Lead: The AAMC Annual Meeting in November 2025. Julie A. Freischlag, MD, chief academic officer and executive vice president of Advocate Health, chief academic officer of Atrium Health Wake Forest Baptist, and executive vice president for health affairs of Wake Forest University, has been elected to serve as chair of the AAMC Board of Directors. She will succeed Lee Jones, MD, dean for medical education and professor of psychiatry at Georgetown University School of Medicine, who will become immediate past chair. Michael Waldrum, MD, MSc, MBA, chief executive officer of ECU Health and dean of the Brody School of Medicine at East Carolina University, has been named chair-elect and will succeed Freischlag next year. AAMC encouraged by SCOTUS decision on mifepristone access

AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, issued a statement on the decision by the Supreme Court in *U.S. Food and Drug Administration v. Alliance for Hippocratic Medicine*. "The AAMC is encouraged by today's U.S. Supreme Court ruling in which the court reversed a 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals decision that would have limited access to the drug mifepristone. In an [amicus brief](#) to the court, the AAMC had expressed grave concerns about the negative impact on the clinical delivery and research missions of academic medicine that would have been realized if the lower court ruling was allowed to stand." Kathy Castor (D-Fla.) and Brian Fitzpatrick (R-Pa.) recognized the unparalleled contributions of academic medicine to the health of patients, families, and communities nationwide by [introducing a resolution](#) in the U.S. House of Representatives. "As we celebrate this inaugural Academic Medicine Week on Capitol Hill, we thank Reps. Castor and Fitzpatrick for shining a light on the critical role that the nation's academic health systems and hospitals and medical schools play in improving the health of our nation," said David J. New environmental justice polling data from the AAMC Center for Health Justice

In April, the AAMC Center for Health Justice conducted a national poll to gauge perspectives around environmental hazards, environmental injustice, and environmental justice. According to this new polling data, 7 in 10 adults in the United States believe in the

goal of environmental justice; however, 8 in 10 are unaware of any federal efforts to advance it. Among the key findings, while U.S. adults believe that lower-income groups (61%) and communities of color (44%) are disproportionately exposed to environmental hazards, significantly fewer report that those same groups bear the burden of environmental injustice (47% and 33%, respectively).â€”Only 44% of U.S. adults think that communities of color are more likely to be exposed to environmental hazards than white communities, despite significant evidence that they are. The new *MedEdPORTAL* Integrated Behavioral Health (IBH) Education Collection equips educators and institutions with curricular innovations to increase collaboration with interprofessional behavioral health teams in undergraduate and graduate medical education. This peer-reviewed collection emphasizes equitable care for all patients and communities by providing health professions educators with the tools they need to train the next generation to address stigma related to substance use and mental health conditions. New AAMC data snapshot examines DEI efforts at U.S. medical schools

A new [AAMC data snapshot](#) explores themes and perspectives among medical school faculty on institutional diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) efforts and highlights specific actions for leaders to consider. Actions to support and foster DEI are essential to successfully achieving the missions of academic medicine. The promotion of these efforts in medical education is part of a broader movement to dismantle systems of oppression in the United States, such as providing equitable support among medical school faculty with the goal of diversifying the physician workforce. To capture the impact of institutional investment in formal DEI efforts, new questions were added to the [AAMC StandPoint[®] Faculty Engagement Survey](#) in 2021 to assess perceptions of diversity and inclusion in the medical school workplace and solicit suggestions for how to improve efforts related to DEI.
