There are many benefits to a GIP membership, including access to monthly GIP newsletters, the GIP listserv and access to GIP member-only resources such as professional development webinars. GIP memberships are available to all AAMC member schools, teaching hospitals and health systems, and are comprised of 1 Principal GIP contact, and an unlimited number of other GIP representatives. For this reason, this position should be held by the most senior person in the organization with planning as their principal responsibility. All other individuals with professional responsibilities in the areas of planning should be appointed as other GIP representatives. The newly redesigned My Engagement account enables the dean or CEO's office to make changes to their GIP memberships; it's the new go-to resource to manage an institution's AAMC profile, review group participation and make updates to institutional affiliations. AAMC statement on Senate Appropriations Committee's FY 2025 HHS spending bill

AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, and Chief Public Policy Officer Danielle Turnipseed, JD, MHSA, MPP, issued a statement in response to the Fiscal Year (FY) 2025 Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies (Labor-HHS) spending bill approved on Aug. 1 by the Senate Appropriations Committee. "The AAMC applauds the Senate Appropriations Committee for working in a bipartisan manner to draft and approve a FY 2025 spending bill that bolsters funding for the National Institutes of Health (NIH), the Health Resources and Services Administration health workforce programs, and other key public health programs and agencies, particularly in a year when appropriators faced challenges drafting a spending bill under an impractical discretionary spending cap. We also greatly appreciate the bipartisan commitment by the committee to avoid problematic policy provisions that would impose arbitrary restrictions on efforts to advance research, education, workforce diversity and health equity, public health, and health care." New article examines social needs screening in academic health systems

A new article co-authored by the AAMC and published in *Population Health Management* explores screening for social needs, which has gained traction as an approach to addressing social determinants of health, but it faces challenges regarding standardization, resource allocation, and follow-up care. A year-long study conducted by the AAMC uses integrated data from conferences, surveys, and key informant interviews

to examine the integration of social needs screening into health care services within academic health systems (AHS). The authors' analysis unveiled eight key themes, showcasing AHS's active involvement in targeted social needs screening alongside persistent resource allocation obstacles. Read More

New AAMC data: Academic medicine fundraising showed strength despite economic challenges in 2023

Amid continuing economic uncertainty, average philanthropic support grew by 7.1% from gift year 2021-22 to gift year 2022-23 at participating academic medicine institutions, according to the latest AAMC Development Survey results. This overall increase was driven primarily by private institutions, where average philanthropic support rose by \$14.3 million, while public institutions experienced a decline of \$4.1 million on average. These figures are not adjusted for inflation and represent unadjusted data from each year's survey. Despite mixed results, the rise in average philanthropic giving may suggest donors' enduring confidence in these institutions' missions. Notably, the total number of transformational gifts and pledges of \$10 million or more received by participating institutions increased, suggesting a possible shift in donor strategies toward larger, more impactful contributions.
