AAMC joins Supreme Court amicus brief opposing Tennessee ban on gender-affirming care

The AAMC joined the American Academy of Pediatrics and more than 20 other national and state medical and mental health organizations in a Supreme Court amicus brief focused on ensuring that all adolescents, including those with gender dysphoria, receive the optimal medical and mental health care they need. The Sept. 3 brief urged the court to vacate the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals decision upholding S.B. 1, a Tennessee law that prohibits health care providers from providing patients under the age of 18 with medically necessary treatments for gender dysphoria. The brief provided background on gender identity and gender dysphoria and detailed the professionally accepted medical guidelines for treating adolescents with gender dysphoria, the scientifically rigorous

process by which the guidelines were developed, and the evidence that gender-affirming care is effective and saves lives. Because the brief focused primarily on adolescents, it did not discuss surgeries that are typically available to transgender adults.

AAMC Submits Statement on Facility Fees, Hospital Contracting in Advance of Markup

The AAMC <u>submitted a statement for the record (PDF)</u> to the House Education and Workforce Committee ahead of its Sept. 11 markup of six bills. The AAMC's statement raised opposition to two pieces of legislation in the markup, the Healthy Competition for Better Care Act (<u>H.R. 3120</u>), which contains AAMC-opposed provisions that would limit the ability of hospitals to negotiate fair contract with insurers, and the Transparent Telehealth Bills Act of 2024 (<u>H.R. 9457</u>), which would ban facility fees for telehealth services. The statement explained how the proposed restrictions on contract negotiations stand to disadvantage hospitals, while insurers continue to make record profits and further consolidate their market share. The AAMC also noted that facility fees are a key component to covering the overheard costs associated with providing telehealth.

New AAMC Research and Action Institute data snapshot examines impact on life expectancy from three preventable causes of death

A new data snapshot developed by the <u>AAMC Research and Action Institute</u> examines how alcohol, drug, and firearm deaths have lowered life expectancy in the United States, which has contributed to the growing gap in life expectancy between the United States and other high-income countries. If deaths due to alcohol, drugs, and firearms were eliminated (and other causes of death remained the same), life expectancy at birth would increase by 1.6 years. Overall, ten states would see a more than two-year jump in life

expectancy if these deaths did not occur. The analysis underscores that shortened life expectancy is closely related to preventable causes of death, which can be improved through targeted public health interventions and investments at the national and state levels, such as in mental health and social services rather than direct changes to clinical care.

AAMC Research and Action Institute data snapshot highlights clinical benefits of not-for-profit health systems beyond charity care

A new data snapshot from the <u>AAMC Research and Action Institute</u> examines the differences in services offered across health systems and hospitals by profitability status, ownership, and teaching status to better illustrate their benefit provided to communities beyond charity care. The authors highlight the discrepancies in services offered across short-term general and critical-access hospitals and how these discrepancies relate to charity care and the policy implications of defining and interpreting charity care differently across institutions. The data show that not-for-profit hospitals — and particularly teaching hospitals — were more likely than for-profit hospitals and nonteaching hospitals to offer a comprehensive list of health care services, including unprofitable ones such as trauma and burn centers and psychiatric services.
