AAMC seeks examples on the impact of executive actions on academic medicine

The recent National Institutes of Health (NIH) announcement on a 15% facilities and administrative (F&A) rate cap and other administration executive orders and actions could have significant implications for AAMC-member institutions and faculty, researchers, learners, and trainees. The AAMC is collecting detailed examples of how this and other executive actions are impacting research, education, clinical care, and overall institutional operations. Responses will help the AAMC advocate on behalf of academic medicine by providing policymakers with concrete evidence of the challenges these changes present. AAMC Joins 600 Organizations in Support of NIH Funding The AAMC joined 600 organizations in a Feb. 25 letter (PDF) urging House and Senate Appropriations Committee leadership to provide robust fiscal year (FY) 2025 funding for the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and protect against cuts to the agency. Specifically, the letter called on Congress to ensure the NIH receives at least the \$1.77 billion increase proposed in the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2025 (<u>S. 4942</u>). Additionally, the letter supports the continuation of legislative language prohibiting changes to NIH facilities and administrative cost reimbursements [refer to *Washington Highlights*, Feb. 14]. "NIH funding is a key driver of economic growth, job creation, and medical breakthroughs, and this policy change would hinder our ability to remain globally competitive," the letter noted. Questions? AAMC statement on the House budget resolution

AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, and Chief Public Policy Officer Danielle Turnipseed, JD, MHSA, MPP, issued a statement on the budget resolution ahead of the vote by the U.S. House of Representatives. "As the House considers its fiscal year 2025 budget resolution, we urge lawmakers to protect access to care for millions of hard-working Americans by rejecting policies that could lead to significant cuts to the Medicaid program and limit access to student financial aid for aspiring physicians." AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD, and Chief Public Policy Officer Danielle Turnipseed, JD, MHSA, MPP, issued a statement regarding firings at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). "We were deeply dismayed to hear reports of broad and, what appear to be, arbitrary firings across many federal agencies and offices directly related to and responsible for the public's health.  $\hat{a} \in {}_{1}^{+}$  We urge [HHS Secretary Kennedy] to reconsider these firings so we can leverage the expertise and experience of these trusted, skilled, dedicated civil servants and work with them to improve the health of the nation."
