Upcoming Webinar: Automating Accreditation and Strategic Planning: A Transformative Dashboard Solution

Date: January 29, 2026 Time: 3:00 PM (EST)

Over three years, the University of Arizona College of Medicine - Tucson has revolutionized its LCME accreditation and strategic planning processes using a software solution built with Microsoft apps and Power BI. This solution is referred to as the Strategic Planning Submission and Reporting Dashboard (SPEED). SPEED automates data collection and reporting, increasing user engagement by 50% and preloading 80% of data for verification and future goal projection. By consolidating data from eight mission areas, SPEED reduces administrative burdens, fosters continuous improvement, and has sparked interest in departmental-level adoption. This session explores how SPEED streamlines accreditation efforts, enhances accountability, and can be adapted at other institutions. This webinar was developed from a session that was previously presented during the 2025 IT in Academic Medicine conference, sponsored by the GIR, in May in Minneapolis. The GIP is collaborating with the GIR on this webinar.

## AAMC AACOM Curriculum SCOPE Survey

The AAMC and the American Association of Osteopathic Colleges of Medicine (AACOM) Curriculum SCOPE Survey is administered by the AAMC and collects medical education program data regarding curriculum structure, content, organization, process, and evaluation. Data from the Curriculum SCOPE Survey supports the AAMC and AACOM missions and advocacy work, informs medical school strategic plans and evidence-based curriculum decisions, and facilitates scholarship and dissemination. Participating medical schools receive a custom SCOPE Medical School Report, which medical schools can use for benchmarking and their own analyses.

New publication on integrating academic and community physician groups A new publication from the AAMC and ECG Management Consultants offers a data-informed, leader-tested framework for academic health systems (AHSs) seeking to integrate academic and community physician groups, which have often functioned in parallel. Based on a national survey of 31 AHSs and in-depth interviews with 18 AHS leaders and medical school deans, *Insights Into Building a Unified Physician Enterprise for the Modern Academic Health System* details how an aligned and cohesive physician enterprise has become a strategic imperative central to clinical growth, financial stability, and the sustainability of the education and research missions.

Updated *Principles for the Responsible Use of Artificial Intelligence in and for Medical Education* now available

Given the rapid growth and evolution of artificial intelligence, the AAMC published the *Principles for the Responsible Use of Artificial Intelligence in and for Medical Education* back in January. Developed with a multidisciplinary expert review committee, the AAMC committed to updating these principles regularly, and the first round of revisions is now available. The updated principles encourage framing responsible use at the individual, institutional, and community levels and offer seven key principles that are meant to be foundational yet flexible for each institution's unique mission, culture, and curriculum.

New polling brief explores trust in the health care system among women A new polling brief published by the AAMC Center for Health Justice explores women's levels of trust in the health care system, as well as in sources of reproductive health care standards, policies, and information. The brief presents findings from a nationally representative poll of 1,203 U.S. adult women conducted in March. Among key findings, a large majority of women (84%) reported trusting the health care system (defined in the poll as clinicians, hospitals and other health care facilities, and insurance plans). However, the majority of Gen Zers and millennials (born 1981-2012) and Black women expressed less trust in the health care system than other women. To sustain and strengthen trust in the health care system, the brief asserts, health care leaders must prioritize culturally relevant community engagement.

The AAMC is leading efforts to explore how artificial intelligence (AI) can enhance tools and services to better support learners, medical schools, and academic health systems. By integrating AI responsibly and transparently, the association aims to improve access to information, streamline processes, and deliver more personalized and efficient experiences across academic medicine. The AAMC is committed to openly sharing how AI is used, including how it supports (but does not replace) human decision-making. While AI can help organize information and improve some steps in the medical school and residency application process, it does not replace human reviewers, program leaders, and experts making decisions about applicants.

Introducing Mission-Aligned Selection and Retention

The AAMC has updated its Holistic Review program in response to feedback from the academic medicine community. This work has been renamed Mission-Aligned Selection and Retention to reflect a clearer focus on aligning recruitment, assessment, and learner support with institutional missions. Mission-aligned selection emphasizes using a program's mission to define merit and identify applicants whose competencies, attributes, and experiences best fit program goals, while mission-aligned retention focuses on building systems that help admitted learners thrive. This change captures how programs are aligning admissions and student support with desired outcomes in patient care, workforce development, and community health. There is no change to the AAMC's commitment to advancing holistic admissions and retention principles, and core principles, tools, and resource contents will remain the same.
