This report shows the national distribution of full-time faculty by characteristics such as department, rank, race/ethnicity, gender, degree, tenure status, and age. You can run the

report for any snapshot date going back to 7/1/1966.

AAMC statement on CY 2026 Hospital Outpatient Prospective Payment System final rule

We are deeply concerned about the cuts to Medicare outpatient hospital payment, including so-called 'site-neutral policies,' which will disproportionately impact AAMC-member health systems and teaching hospitals and harm their ability to care for the most complex patients. The rule also adds administrative and regulatory burden on providers, running counter to the administration's goal of reducing unnecessary regulation."

AAMC files amicus brief in First Circuit Court of Appeals opposing NIH grant terminations

The AAMC [filed a Nov. 19 amicus brief](#) in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the First Circuit in *American Public Health Association et al. v NIH*, a case

opposing the sudden termination of hundreds of research grants from the National Institutes of Health (NIH). The brief provides the perspective from the research community on the devastating impact of sudden, arbitrary grant terminations on the stability of the research enterprise and the careers of scientists. It asks the court to affirm the district court's decision directing the NIH to reinstate grants unlawfully terminated based on a purported "change in agency priorities" and to cease delaying, suspending, or cancelling steps needed to review applications for future or ongoing NIH grant funding.

Update on the future of the Summer Health Professions Education Program

After more than 35 years, the Summer Health Professions Education Program's (SHPEP) founding partner and core funder has made the decision to end its funding after the completion of the 2026 cohort. This decision is not a reflection of the program's success. SHPEP has inspired and supported thousands of future leaders in medicine, dentistry, and beyond, and the National Program Office, led by the AAMC and the American Dental Education Association (ADEA), are proud of the community that's grown around it. Distribution of 400 new Medicare-supported GME residency positions marks milestone in expanding the physician workforce

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) has announced the distribution of 400 new Medicare-supported graduate medical education (GME) positions. "These additional residency positions demonstrate bipartisan support for continued investment in physician training and are instrumental to increasing access to care for patients by allowing more residents to serve communities nationwide," said AAMC President and CEO David J. Skorton, MD. "Although there is still a lot of work to be done to help alleviate the persistent physician shortage in this country, today is another very meaningful step forward."

AAMC joins amicus brief challenging 340B rebate program

The AAMC joined 340B Health and America's Essential Hospitals in an amicus brief supporting a challenge to a fundamental shift in the 340B Drug Pricing Program scheduled to take effect Jan. 1, which will result in immediate and irreparable harm to safety-net hospitals and their patients. The brief illustrates how the rebate program will threaten patient access to essential health care and services provided by 340B hospitals and how the Health Resources and Services Administration rushed its approval and failed to consider less costly alternatives or the harm attributable to the drastic change.

AAMC Sends Year-End Letter to Congress Outlining Pending Advocacy Priorities

The AAMC [sent a year-end letter](#) on December 16th to congressional leadership emphasizing key pending advocacy priorities for the academic medicine community, including robust fiscal year (FY) 2026 appropriations for key science and health programs, investments in the health care workforce, and policies to ensure the financial sustainability of academic health systems. In the letter, the AAMC urged Congress to complete the final FY 2026 spending bills before the current continuing resolution expires at the end of January [refer to [Washington Highlights, Nov. 14](#)]. The letter urged strong support for the National Institutes of Health (NIH), including strengthening support for facilities and administrative expenses through the NIH and other research agencies; robust investment in each of the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) health professions programs; and full funding for other key agencies and priorities. In addition, the letter called upon Congress to strengthen the health care workforce by expanding Medicare support for graduate medical education (GME), reauthorizing the HRSA Title VII and VIII programs, and enacting long-term authorizations and continued funding for the National Health Service Corps, the Teaching Health Center

GME program, and the Community Health Centers program. Finally, the letter further advocated for Congress to address expiring health provisions before Jan. 30, including scheduled cuts to the Medicaid Disproportionate Share Hospital program and key telehealth flexibilities. The letter highlighted the financial challenges created by the impending expiration of the enhanced premium tax credits on Dec. 31, 2025, calling upon Congress to address this issue.

Following the joint GBA and GSA call in late 2025 around student financial aid information, additional questions arose around how information is being communicated to students. Register for the GIR/GIP Webinar, Automating Accreditation and Strategic Planning: A Transformative Dashboard Solution

Join us on January 29th from 3:00-4:00 pm. ET for a webinar presented by the GIR and GIP. Over three years, the University of Arizona College of Medicine - Tucson has revolutionized its LCME accreditation and strategic planning processes using a software solution built with Microsoft apps and Power BI. This solution is referred to as the Strategic Planning Submission and Reporting Dashboard (SPEED). SPEED automates data collection and reporting, increasing user engagement by 50% and preloading 80% of data for verification and future goal projection. By consolidating data from eight mission

areas, SPEED reduces administrative burdens, fosters continuous improvement, and has sparked interest in departmental-level adoption. This session explores how SPEED streamlines accreditation efforts, enhances accountability, and can be adapted at other institutions.

This webinar was developed from a session that was previously presented during the 2025 IT in Academic Medicine Conference, sponsored by the GIR. The GIP is collaborating with the GIR on this webinar.
