#### **Appropriators To Meet November 12 To Discuss Spending Bill Caps**

Reports the week of November 4 indicated that the White House would like to avoid a government shutdown on November 22, following expiration of the current continuing resolution (CR) on November 21. The administration may also be backing down on demands for \$8.6 billion for the border wall in FY 2020 (*CQ*, subscription required). Senate Appropriations Committee Chair Richard Shelby (R-Ala.) separately shared that leadership of the House and Senate Appropriations Committees intend to meet November 12 to discuss allocations for the 12 spending bills.

House Majority Leader Steny Hoyer (D-Md.) November 8 sent a "Dear Colleague" letter to members of the House of Representatives indicating that the House will take up consideration of a new continuing resolution the week of November 18. Ongoing discussions amongst Congressional leadership indicate an interest in extending the next CR into mid- to late-December.

#### Rep. Peter King to Retire at End of Current Term

Rep. Peter King (R-N.Y.) November 11 <u>announced that he will not run for re-election</u> in 2020. Rep. King is currently serving his 14th term in Congress and serves as a lead sponsor of the yearly NIH "Dear Colleague" letter in the House.

# NIH Releases Draft Policy for Data Sharing and Management, Seeks Public Comment

The NIH November 6 released for public comment in the <u>Federal Register</u> a Draft NIH Policy for Data Management and Sharing along with supplement draft guidance. According to <u>a blog post authored by NIH Associate Director of Science Policy</u>, Carrie Wolinetz, PhD, "The draft policy furthers NIH longstanding commitment to making available the results and products of the research we fund and conduct." NIH has established a <u>web-portal</u> where the public can provide their feedback. Responses must be submitted no later than January 10, 2020.

#### NIAID Blog on Stigma and HIV

The National Institutes of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) posted a November 4 blog post "about HIV-related stigma, its effects on health, and how research is informing strategies to reduce stigma and improve HIV outcomes." The blog included an interview with Dianne Rausch, Ph.D., director of the Division of AIDS Research (DAR) at NIH's National Institute of Mental Health, and

Gregory Greenwood, Ph.D., DAR program officer and stigma expert. The interviewees discussed how research on HIV stigma is leading to new interventions to help patients cope with stigma, and is also helping to increase awareness of interventions such as pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP).
