President's FY 2021 Budget Request Released; Administration to Testify

The president's <u>FY 2021 budget request</u> has been released, including a \$3 billion, or more than 7% cut, to NIH. HHS also released its <u>Budget in Brief</u>, and NIH released its FY 2021 <u>Congressional Justification</u>. The Ad Hoc Group for Medical Research <u>released a press</u> <u>statement</u>, urging Congress to reject the proposal which would "would devastate the agency's ability to pursue promising new science to improve and save lives."

Representatives from the administration are expected to testify before Congress later in the week regarding the budget request. Acting <u>Director of the Office of Management and</u> <u>Budget (OMB) Russell Vought</u> is expected to testify before the House Budget Committee on Wednesday, February 12, at 10:00am. <u>Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin</u> is expected to testify before the Senate Finance Committee on Wednesday, February 12, at 1:00pm. <u>Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar</u> is expected to testify before the Senate Finance Committee on Senate Finance Committee on Thursday, February 13, at 9:30am.

House Appropriators Set Member Deadlines for FY 2021 Budget Requests

The House Appropriations Committee has <u>set deadlines for member submissions</u> for FY 2021 budget requests. The deadline for the Members of the House of Representatives to submit requests for the FY 2021 Labor-HHS spending bill is March 13.

Lowey, DeLauro Urge HHS to Seek Emergency Supplemental Funds for Coronavirus

House Appropriations Chair Nita Lowey (D-N.Y.) and House Labor-HHS Subcommittee Chair Rosa DeLauro (D-Conn.) <u>sent a letter on February 4 urging HHS Secretary Alex</u> <u>Azar</u> to ask Congress for emergency supplemental appropriations to combat coronavirus, if needed, "instead of transferring funds from other important HHS activities, including NIH research…"

Open Mike: What's Happening With "At-Risk Investigators?"

In a <u>February 7 Open Mike blog post</u>, NIH Deputy Director for Extramural Research Michael Lauer, MD, described NIH's recent progress in supporting principal investigators who are at risk of losing substantial NIH support for the next fiscal year. Consistent with the Next Generation Researchers Initiative (NGRI), the funding rate for "at-risk" investigators improved from 21% in FY 2017 to 27% in FYs 2018 and 2019. The comparable rate for established investigators remained relatively stable at 29% in FY 2017, 33% in FY 2018, and 31% in FY 2019. By helping direct funding across the career stage of investigators, the NGRI seeks to ensure a competitive, viable future research workforce.

NIH Posts Guidance for FY 2020 Legislative Mandates, Salary Limit Increase

The <u>NIH's Extramural Nexus</u> summarizes a <u>February 5 guide notice</u> on NIH Fiscal Operations for FY 2020. The guidance explains that the <u>salary limit for Executive Level II</u> <u>has increased</u> to \$197,300, non-competing awards made in FY 2020 will be issued at the commitment level indicated on the Notice of Award, the Ruth L. Kirschstein National Research Service Awards (NRSA) will increase by 2% for predoctoral students and 4-5% for postdoctoral researchers, and meritorious R01-equivalent applications from early stage investigators will be prioritized.

Brink News: More People Are Surviving Cancer. What's Next?

Ross McKinney Jr, MD, AAMC chief scientific officer, authored an <u>opinion piece in *Brink*</u> <u>News</u> on February 4, World Cancer Day, discussing the state of cancer care and the future of cancer treatments. Dr. McKinney highlighted that continued advances in medical research have revolutionized cancer treatments in the last few decades, improving treatment outcomes, and that further progress will depend on sustained funding and collaboration.

Global Health Technologies Coalition Releases R&D Factsheets

<u>The Global Health Technologies Coalition launched a new factsheet series</u> that examines the role of research and development (R&D) — including R&D funded by NIH—in driving progress across different global health areas. The factsheets focus on HIV/AIDS, malaria, tuberculosis, neglected tropical diseases, emerging infectious diseases, and maternal, newborn, and child health.

The White House Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP) has issued a request for information (RFI) on characteristics of data repositories, on behalf of the multi-agency Subcommittee on Open Science of the National Science and Technology Council's Committee on Science. The proposed set of desirable characteristics for data repositories is part of the Subcommittee's efforts to improve the consistency of information that Federal agencies provide to the scientific community about the long-term preservation of data resulting from Federally funded research. The modernization initiative aims to "update the technological infrastructure underlying ClinicalTrials.gov, enhance its public-facing components, and deliver a modern user experience with a platform and services that continue to accommodate growth and enhance efficiency." Comments must be submitted electronically by March 14. Additionally, NLM will host a public meeting on April 30 to elicit further comments.
