Last week's omnibus spending bill represents a significant victory for medical research. We must continue ensuring that our doctors and scientists have the funding they need to develop new vaccines and discover better treatments and cures for diseases like cancer and Alzheimer's.

1. Bloomberg BNA: How NIH, FDA Became the Cool Kids in the Capitol

A March 28 <u>article</u> in Bloomberg's Health Care Blog discussed how both NIH Director Francis Collins, MD, PhD, and FDA Commissioner Scott Gottlieb, MD, gained the respect of lawmakers from both sides of the aisle. The article notes NIH's \$3 billion increase in the fiscal year (FY) 2018 omnibus, and points out the request granted to Dr. Collins to incorporate "other transactions authority" for the NIH's opioid initiatives.

2. Science: Congress Gives Science a Record Funding Boost

On March 30, an <u>article</u> in Science highlighted the "\$4.8 billion increase that the U.S. Congress showered on nine leading civilian science agencies," including the \$3 billion NIH boost to NIH. The article also, however, points out that most of the government spending laid out in the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018 was provided in fiscal year 2018, saying "researchers shouldn't expect a repeat of this year's windfall in fiscal 2019, which starts on 1 October 2018."

3. House Appropriations Labor-H Subcommittee Posts Public Witness Hearing & Testimony Instructions for FY 2019

The House Appropriations Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies <u>released</u> a notice for its FY 2019 public witness hearing and instructions to submit testimony for the record. The hearing will be held on April 26 at 10am in 2358-C Rayburn House Office Building. The subcommittee set an April 6 deadline to submit a request to testify and an April 26 deadline to submit written testimony for the record.

4. House Appropriations Labor-H Subcommittee FY 2019 Members Day Hearing Scheduled

The FY 2019 Members Day <u>hearing</u> for the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies has been scheduled for 10am to noon on April 17. The hearing will take place in 2358-C Rayburn House Office Building.

5. Deadlines posted for Senate Labor-H FY 2019 Outside Witness Testimony

The Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education, and Related Agencies <u>posted</u> instructions for submitting outside witness testimony ahead of its work on FY 2019 appropriations. According to the instructions, testimony should be no longer than four pages and sent to the Subcommittee no later than close of business June 1.

6. 9th Annual Medical Imaging Technology Showcase – April 10

From 5 to 7pm on April 10 in 902 Hart Senate Office Building, the Academy for Radiology & Biomedical Imaging Research and the Coalition for Imaging & Bioengineering Research will host an event to showcase advances in cutting-edge medical imaging technology.
