#### 1. House Appropriations Labor-H Subcommittee Public Witness Hearing This Week

The House Appropriations Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies (Labor-H) Subcommittee will hold its fiscal year (FY) 2019 public witness hearing on April 26 at 10am in 2358-C Rayburn House Office Building. Interested parties can submit written testimony for the record until April 26. According to the subcommittee website, the hearing will be webcast.

#### 2. NIH Announces Retirement of Director of Center for Scientific Review

On April 18, NIH Director Francis Collins, MD, PhD, issued a <u>statement</u> on the retirement of Richard Nakamura, PhD, who serves as the director for the NIH's Center for Scientific Review. Dr. Collins highlighted Dr. Nakamura's "illustrious 39-year career at NIH." The statement also says, "Following Richard's departure and while we conduct a national search for a new director, I have asked Noni Byrnes, Ph.D., to serve as acting director." Dr. Nakamura's retirement is expected "later this month."

### 3. NIH Principal Deputy Director Discusses "Optimize NIH" at Town Hall

The NIH Record <u>posted</u> an article that detailed a presentation by Lawrence Tabak, DDS, PhD, principal deputy director for the NIH, in which he provided updates on an agency plan called, "Optimize NIH." This agency plan is in response to a directive from the Office of Management and Budget to make the federal government "lean, accountable and more efficient." As a result, the Department of Health and Human Services created its "Reimagine HHS" initiative and, subsequently, the NIH created its initiative. This initiative is expected to take 2-3 years to complete.

#### 4. NIH Council of Councils Meeting – May 18

Through a Federal Register <u>notice</u>, the NIH announced a meeting of the Council of Councils, scheduled for May 18. Items listed on the agenda include announcements and updates, evaluating the "Broadening Experiences in Scientific Training (BEST)" Awards; NIDA update; an introduction to the use of Non-Human Primates (NHP) in addiction research; NHP models of

drug addiction. The meeting will take place at NIH campus, 9000 Rockville Pike, Building 31, C Wing, 6th Floor, Conference Room 10, Bethesda, MD 20892.

# 5. Deadlines posted for Senate Labor-H FY 2019 Outside Witness Testimony

The Senate Appropriations Labor-H Subcommittee <u>posted</u> instructions for submitting outside witness testimony ahead of its work on FY 2019 appropriations. According to the instructions, testimony should be no longer than four pages and sent to the Subcommittee no later than close of business June 1.
