# Ad Hoc Group Weekly Round Up - May 28, 2019

### 1. Budget Caps Negotiations Stall

Congressional and Trump administration leadership met May 21 to discuss a two-year budget deal, with the potential to include a debt ceiling agreement in the package. Negotiators did not come to a consensus over the course of the day-long talks, with Democrats mentioning the need for continued discussion around domestic spending (*Bloomberg*, subscription required).

Reaching a deal on budget caps for FY 2020 is important for the continuation of the work of appropriators to fund the government in FY 2020. The Ad Hoc Group for Medical Research joined a May 17 <u>letter</u>, which is signed by 15 research coalitions representing over 500 member organizations, urging the president and Congressional leaders to "reach a bipartisan budget agreement to raise the defense and non-defense discretionary spending caps for FY20 and FY21 above the levels specific in the Budget Control Act (BCA)."

### 2. FY 2020 Public Witness Testimony Deadlines

The Senate Appropriations Labor-HHS Subcommittee posted <u>instructions</u> for submitting outside witness testimony ahead of its work on FY 2020 appropriations. According to the instructions, testimony should be no longer than four pages and sent to the Subcommittee no later than close of business June 3.

### 3. NIH Partners with Radiology Societies to Set Goals for AI in Medical Imaging

The NIH May 28 released a <u>press statement</u> describing a new report which "provides a roadmap for translation research on artificial intelligence (AI) in medical imaging." NIBIB contributed to the report, alongside several radiology societies. NIBIB Director of Research Science sand Strategic Directions Krishna Kandarpa, MD, PhD, noted, "This roadmap is a timely survey and analysis by experts at federal agencies and among our industry and professional societies that will help us take the best advantage of AI technologies as they impact the medical imaging field."

### 4. Open Mike: Outcomes for NIH Loan Repayment Program Awardees

NIH Deputy Director for Extramural Research Michael Lauer, MD, wrote a May 21 *Open Mike* <u>blog post</u> about the NIH Loan Repayment Program (LRP). Through the LRP, NIH can "can repay up to \$35,000 in <u>educational loans</u> per year" for early stage investigators. A recent analysis of the LRP shows awardees demonstrate increased research persistence, a measure that includes "submitting grant or fellowship applications, receiving grant or

fellowship awards, and publications." This persistence is evident 15 years after the LRP award.

# 5. International Commission on Genome Editing Launched by National Academies

The National Academy of Medicine May 22 <u>convened</u> a new international commission "to develop a framework for scientists, clinicians, and regulatory authorities to consider when assessing potential clinical applications of human germline genome editing." Commission participants represent international universities, research societies, and industry and are charged with seven tasks, including identifying: scientific issues with potential applications of gene editing; appropriate protocols for validating use; and appropriate protocols for patient consent.
